Thank you to all of you that completed the mandatory Annual Rideshare Survey! Each year, we find the most common questions regarding the surveys are as follows:

Why do we have to complete this survey? How is the information gathered from this survey used?

Air Quality Management District (AQMD) Rule 2202 requires every major employer in Orange County to conduct an annual survey. When it is all done, there is a number generated from how many people use alternative methods to come to work, as opposed to driving alone. That number then determines if we meet the State requirement for the year and what fees we need to provide.

I don't carpool or ride transit. Do I still have to complete the survey?

Yes! Since our City offers a 9/80 work schedule, for every person who fills out their survey (even if they drove alone) but have a 9/80 day off, we received credit. Unfortunately, for each person who does not turn in their form, we receive no credit and that can harm our bottom line number.

I already carpool or ride transit. Do I still have to take the survey?

Yes! We especially need you to complete the survey so we receive credit for your efforts.

Mariner's Mile Revitalization Master Plan Community Workshop July 25, 2016

With completion of the study evaluating roadway capacity requirements for West Coast Highway, the City will be evaluating existing land use policies and regulations, which may inhibit revitalization of the area. The Mariners' Mile Revitalization Master Plan is intended to identify potential refinements or barriers to revitalizing the area.

The first community workshop is intended to introduce the community to the Master Plan purpose and process as well as obtain initial feedback from the public about opportunities, challenges, and ideas for improvement of the Mariners' Mile neighborhood. The community workshop is scheduled for **Monday, July 25 from 7 p.m. through 9 p.m. at the Newport Sea Base, Yacht Room located at 1931 West Coast Highway.**

FEMA Preliminary Flood Maps

At the July 12, 2016, City Council Study Session, staff made a presentation on the Federal Emergency Management Agency's preliminary flood maps. The topic is of significant importance as it expands the flood zone and places thousands of new private properties in the flood zone. Most of the properties affected are located on Balboa Peninsula and Bay Island, with some of the properties surrounding Newport Harbor also being affected. Staff has hired a consultant, Everest International Consultants Inc. to review FEMA's data and provide an

Operations Department (MOD) Storm Drain Division spent about two hours cleaning up using a vactor truck. Code Enforcement was able to contact the contractor who admitted responsibility for causing the discharge.



CalPERS Investment Results

This week CalPERS announced preliminary investment results of .61% for fiscal year ended June 30, 2016, missing the target return by 6.89%. This marks the second consecutive year that PERS missed their target rate of return of 7.5%. For the fiscal year ended June 30, 2015, the PERS investment portfolio earned 2.4% missing the target by 5.1%. The two fiscal years prior to fiscal year ended 2015 the PERS investment fund posted investment returns of 18.4% and 12.5%. The latest results represent a significant setback for local agencies still reeling from the 2009 portfolio loss of 24%.



The latest results are largely reflective of anemic economic growth and turmoil around the world. As one might expect, global equities, which make up 50% of the PERS portfolio, posted a loss of 3.4% and fixed income securities posted a 9.29% positive return but only makes up 17% the total portfolio. The bond rally was heavily influenced by panic in the equities market induced by Brexit fears late in the year.

For the City of Newport Beach, this means that the June 30, 2015, investment result will translate into a \$29 million adverse experience loss and the June 30, 2016, investment result will translate into a \$40 million experience loss. Tallying up those losses, our unfunded liability is now expected to exceed \$300 million from our last valuation, which marked the unfunded liability at \$252 million.

The City and employees continue to address this issue aggressively with employee contributions approaching \$9.5 million annually and paying down the liability on an aggressive 18-year schedule.

RETIRED FIRE CHIEF PASSES AWAY

Newport Beach retired Fire Chief, Jim Reed, passed away last week on July 21. Chief Reed was a Navy veteran, joined our department in 1961, and served as Fire Chief from 1978 to 1991. He was responsible for many things such as the EOC at FS3, our HazMat Team, EMT for firefighters, and annual physical fitness testing. He also brought us up to an ISO Class 2 Fire Department where we remain today. He was very proud of our department.

Chief Reed retired after working 30 years in Newport Beach and he continued to work as a consultant and interim Fire Chief for the cities of Costa Mesa, Pismo Beach, Upland, Covina, Arcadia, Laguna Beach and Alameda.

I had the opportunity to speak with him several times and although retired, he was always very interested in the best for our department. I will miss him as he was a good person and after spending 45 years in the fire service, provided insight and inspiration to me, and all of us.

Chief Reed is survived by his wife Sheri, two sons Kevin and David, who followed after their father and went into the fire service, five grandchildren, and four great grandchildren.



FIRE OPERATIONS

On Thursday evening, July 14, firefighters were dispatched to a structure fire at 900 Bayside Drive – Bayside Restaurant.


Patrons were evacuated from the restaurant while firefighters accessed the roof using a ladder. Firefighters then cut a hole in the roof to find the exact location of the fire. They tracked the blaze to a loft area above the bathrooms that housed mechanical equipment. The fire was contained to the restaurant's attic and caused \$50,000 in damages.

Collision at Cassidy's

On Monday morning, July 18, a car jumped the curb, and ran into Cassidy's Bar & Grill. No injuries, but there was significant damage to the building and the car.



EMS DIVISION



EMS Division Chief Kristin Thompson, EMS Captain Phil Puhek, and the crew at Fire Station #3 at Fashion Island, assisted with Layperson CPR and AED Training during a Lunch and Learn session. During the well-attended event, the audience gained knowledge on how to perform Layperson CPR and use an AED, as well as preparing for 911 arrival and what happens when you call 911.

New EMS bags containing EMS equipment such as oxygen, bandaging equipment for bleeding control and advanced airway devices were put into service. EMS bags are 30 pounds lighter and more ergonomic to carry than the old hardcover "suitcase" style cases. Equipment was consolidated into fewer bags as well.

The Newport Beach Fire Department has seen an increase in non-fatal or near drowning incidents over the past two months. Incidents involved children as well as adults. Nationally, the leading causes of injury death in 1-4 year-olds is drowning.

A few Key Prevention Tips

- **Learn life-saving skills:** Everyone should know CPR and the basics of swimming (floating, moving through the water).
- **Fence it off:** Install a four-sided isolation fence, at least four feet tall, with self-closing and self-latching gates, around swimming pools. This can help keep children away from the area when they are not supposed to be swimming.
- **Make life jackets a must:** Make sure children wear life jackets in and around natural bodies of water, such as lakes or the ocean, even if they know how to swim. Life jackets can also be worn in and around pools for less experienced swimmers.
- **Be on the lookout:** When children are in or near water (including bathtubs), closely supervise them at all times. Because drowning happens quickly and quietly, adults watching children in or near water should avoid distracting activities. Keep young children within arm's reach of an adult.
- Empty all tubs, buckets, containers and kiddie pools immediately after use. Store them upside down so they don't collect water.
- Close toilet lids and use toilet seat locks. Keep doors to bathrooms and laundry rooms closed.
- Don't swim alone, regardless of your age or swimming abilities.

Hoag Hospital Honors Mike and Andy!

On July 13, Hoag Hospital hosted their 37th annual Project Wipeout lecture teaching Spinal Awareness. This annual lecture draws over 400 lifeguards throughout Southern California to hear speakers on subjects ranging from medical advances to professionalism. Project Wipeout was started by a coalition of Hoag Hospital Emergency Department Doctors, and Newport Beach Lifeguards and Firefighters. Lifeguard Captain Mike Ure and Lifeguard Officer Andy Matsuyama were recognized for their rescue in Corona del Mar of the shark victim in May of this year.

Hot Dogs! Come Get Your Hot Dogs!



On Thursday, July 14, the 36th annual Junior Lifeguard Hot Dog Dinner was held at Jr. Lifeguard Headquarters. Our Junior Lifeguard Instructors cooked 4,000 hot dogs for our participants and their families. The families also contributed some delicious desserts!

Rescue on the Rocks

On Saturday, July 16, at around 5:00 p.m., Newport Beach lifeguards responded with the Orange County Sheriffs Harbor Patrol to a report of swimmers and a deputy on the rocks off of Cameo Shores. Cameo Shores is in the south end of the City's coast. A group of six personal watercrafts were in the water, with two having flipped over. Lifeguards arrived, rescued three victims off the rocks, and brought them onto the rescue boat. The Harbor Patrol transported one victim to Newport Beach Medics.



Teamwork



On July 18, Newport Lifeguards participated in joint training with the US Coast Guard MH-65C helicopter off the Newport Pier. The lifeguards and the Coast Guard crews practiced hoisting operations from the deck of the rescue boat and retrieving a basket (that would hold a body) from the water.

Hoisting from the deck of a boat requires tremendous amount of skill and coordination between the helicopter pilot and the boat operator. The helicopter and boat need to match speed and direction exactly, while the basket is being lowered and hoisted.



Hello...Shark?

In the wake of the shark incident in May, Newport Beach Lifeguards have deployed three acoustic receivers at the Newport Pier, Balboa Pier and Corona del Mar swim lines. The receivers will record any marine animal (including sharks) that have been tagged and come within 500 yards of the receiver. The data will be sent to the shark lab at CSU Long Beach and will help determine activity. After three weeks of being in the water, we have had no recordings of tagged sharks in our coastal waters.





Water Use Customer Portal Now Live!



We are excited to announce that Newport Beach Water Customers can now view their water usage from the convenience of their computer or mobile device. MyWaterNB allows them to see their up to date water use, report and view water outages, and communicate with our water utility. Customers can also view and participate in our water conversation programs, which will reduce their water footprint. The best part is that it is free! Lifeguard Towers on the Move

Just before the start of summer, our Beach Maintenance Crew relocated the lifeguard towers closer to the ocean. This allows the Lifeguards to have a better view of the people in the water. Additionally, our staff assisted with the replacement of the older lifeguard towers, including the 10-year-old tower in Marina Park. These new towers were built near the Newport Pier, then using a loader, they were placed on a trailer, moved down the beach, and off-loaded by our crew at their new location. After the summer is over, the towers will be moved away from the ocean due to the potential damage of winter storms.

Recently, the Asphalt crew has been working in Newport Coast area to repair street and bike lanes damaged by tree roots. The raised asphalt areas of the bike lanes had been making it difficult for bicycle riders to utilize the lanes. Approximately 7,500 square feet of roadway at 26 locations on Vista Ridge and Ridge Park were repaired with 200 tons of asphalt over three weeks.

EXPLORER SCHOLARSHIP







Newport Theater Arts Center - Upcoming Construction

Council recently awarded the Newport Theater Arts Center Building Improvements contract to Optima RPM to perform some much need structural improvements and replace the existing roof with a new energy efficient "Cool Roof". By installing the new "Cool Roof" the building's heating and cooling costs are expected to decrease by approximately \$500 per year.



During construction the theater will remain open. Public Works will be working with Optima RPM to complete this project without any disruption to the theater's busy schedule. With the completion of this project the Newport Theater Arts Building will continue to serve the community for many years to come. Should you have any questions about construction

Damaged Pier Piling Removal



A pier piling under the Balboa Ocean Pier was recently damaged by a set of strong surfs recently. To prevent future damage to the pier understructure, John S. Meek Construction Company was dispatched last week to remove the dislodged pile from the ocean floor. Upon

inspection, it was evident that the dislodgement was caused by the weakened and hollow pile section that had broken off near the ocean floor mud line. A new pile will soon be installed as a part of the Ocean Piers' Maintenance Project. The City's Municipal Oceans' piers were designed and constructed with overlapping structural support systems under their concrete decks to handle this type of incident without service interruptions.




Damaged Pier Piling, Balboa Ocean Pier

Park Avenue Bridge Progress

With the temporary bridge in place and functioning as intended, the contractor, John S. Meek Company (Meek), has started removing the old bridge with special tools and equipment that fit the constrained job site. Meek will soon take delivery of large steel casings and take advantage of the remaining bridge deck as a support platform to drill and install the two rows of piles for the new bridge. Drop By Drop - Newport Beach is Saving Water



Achieving a goal for water conservation is a challenge. Variables such as summer heat and visitors shift conservation levels monthly. That being said, the City can be proud of achieving our required twenty-one percent reduction. In fact we exceeded it! Our cumulative water savings (baseline comparison 2013) was twenty-two percent! This means the City saved an outstanding 128,231,750 gallons*. That's nearly 400 acre feet of water! The drought continues. Our new goal thru February 2017 is set at fifteen percent. Filler' Up, Stay Healthy and Save the Planet

Public Works has been systematically upgrading water fountains to bottle fill stations across the City!

Why?

Each bottle fill station saves about 8,000 plastic bottles/year - reusable containers are all the rage. Globally we throw away 50 billion plastic bottles/year. Yes, that's billion with a "B". Only 12% of all plastic bottles are recycled.

The production of water bottles uses 17 million barrels of oil a year, and it takes three times the water to make the bottle as it does to fill it.

Almost half of all bottled water purchased actually comes from tap water. Newport Beach tap water is 560 times less expensive than bottled water and is great to drink!



SUMMER BBQ IN THE OASIS COURTYARD
