The "Vue Newport" on Balboa Peninsula






"Vue Newport" (previously called "Newport Bay Marina") sits on a 2.4 acre site with subterranean and street level parking. The project consists of 27 residential units with 36,000 square feet of commercial space. A central public plaza leads to a waterfront public walkway with visitor boat slips. The project is expected to open early 2017.

Protecting Our Ocean and Bays

Code Enforcement staff responded to a call regarding construction debris being washed into the storm drain in the 100 block of 34th Street on April 20. By the time staff arrived, the prohibited materials had already entered the catch basin. Code Enforcement staff located the



responsible party who indicated they were not equipped to clean up the large spill. Staff from the Municipal Operations Department (MOD) Storm Drain Division were called out and spent about two hours cleaning up using a vactor truck.


This incident is an important reminder of how crucial it is for builders and residents to have effective best mangement practice on hand during even the smallest construction projects to ensure that all prohibited materials, including the accidental ones, do not end up in the

storm drain system. It can take just a few minutes for discharged materials to reach the ocean once they enter the catch basins on the Balboa Peninsula. Any spill, no matter how small, can cause serious damage to the precious water ecosystems.



FIRE OPERATIONS

On Sunday, April 17, the Newport Beach Fire Department responded to a heavy-rescue traffic collision involving two vehicles. At approximately 2:00 p.m., a small sedan travelling on Santa Barbara Drive collided with a large box-truck, propelling the smaller vehicle under the rear of the truck. There were three people in the sedan, including the front passenger trapped who was by the impact. With the dash and exterior of the car collapsed around the patient, Newport Beach Fire Department was dispatched from its nearby Newport Center fire station and provided extrication of the patient using the Jaws of Life.



As our paramedics tended to the patient's injuries from inside the crumpled sedan, the patient was carefully removed, placed on a backboard, and transported to the Orange County Global Medical Center for treatment.

House Fire

Sunday, April 10, at 3:55 a.m., the fire department responded to a structure fire in the 100 block of 31st Street in Newport Beach. Upon arrival, firefighters found a two-story duplex with smoke coming out of the first floor unit and all occupants out of the building.



The fire was extinguished with no injuries reported. The fire investigation determined that the fire was caused by combustibles in close proximity to the fireplace. The estimated damaged caused by the fire was \$40,000 in structure, and \$5,000 in personal belongings. Fortunately, occupants were alerted of the fire by the smell of smoke. During the fire investigation, it was determined that the smoke detector in the downstairs unit was not in working condition.

The Newport Beach Fire Department would like to remind everyone to check their smoke detectors at least twice a year to make sure the batteries are good and that their smoke detectors are in good working condition.



CERT HAM Radio Certification Class

Last week, the fire department hosted a HAM radio certification training class over two evenings and a Saturday for volunteers in our CERT program. The 14-hour certification class was taught by renowned HAM radio expert Gordon West and covered everything needed to pass the FCC HAM radio technician certification. Topics covered throughout the class included basic FCC regulations, HAM radio operating practices, and electronics theory with an emphasis on VHF and UHF applications. All participants passed the FCC exam and will start participating in weekly RACES (Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Services) on Monday nights. On March 31, Newport Beach lifeguards completed their monthly dive training near the Newport Pier. This training allows lifeguards to maintain their diving and scuba skills, as well as ensure their equipment is functioning properly.


Newport Beach Surf Report



Our statistics show that early morning, around 7:00-9:00 a.m., is the peak period phone calls are made to our Surf Report Line.





The Surf Report phone line may average over 100,000 calls this year, and may be as high as 120,000 when the busy spring and summer months are included. Those are impressive numbers.



New Monument for the Old Landing

Earlier this month, Concrete crew members Humberto "Beto" Saldivar and Juan Delgado constructed a new monument to display the "Old Landing" plaque at the south side of Coast Highway at Dover Drive, east of the Bayshores entrance. This plaque designates the location where sternwheel steamer *Vaquero* became the first ship to land in Newport Bay on September 10, 1870. Both Beto and Juan are very skilled in construction and the monument is a testament to their talents. The plaque had previously been displayed on Dover Drive, north of the Highway; very few people were aware of its existence at that location. The monument will be enjoyed by visitors and residents alike for years to come.

Run, Hide, Fight!

Detective Marie Gamble from the Police Department recently provided active shooter training at the Corporate and Utilities Yards. Her dynamic PowerPoint presentation included information on the *Run*, *Hide*, *Fight* strategy for surviving an active shooter. She also provided valuable insight on past active shooter incidents. Detective Gamble offered in depth answers to the numerous questions from staff. She also made some simple and effective recommendations to improve staff security after walking through the work areas in both Yards. Thank you, Detective Gamble!

San Miguel Park Turf Renovation

Landscape Division staff have identified several redundant turf areas near parking lots or other hardscapes where irrigation run-off can be an issue. These areas have been placed on a list for future renovation. One such area is San Miguel Park where our crew recently replaced the parking lot median turf with drought-tolerant, colorful plants. These plants included Fire Sticks, Aloes, Creeping Sage and Sedge Grass. Additionally, the irrigation was modified with low-precipitation, precision nozzles.

Disinfection System Upgrades

The Water Production Crew recently completed an overhaul of the water disinfection system at the 16th Street pump station. This system controls the flow of chemicals that are used to disinfect the City's drinking water. Overall, 300 feet of new piping, four new manifolds and sodium hypochlorite pumps, a suction manifold, and two aqueous ammonia pumps were installed. Additionally, the overhead lighting was upgraded to energy efficient LEDs. The newly installed pumps are more energy-efficient, have a higher pumping capacity, and are easier to



maintain. With this project now complete, the disinfection system is functioning better than ever and looks great.

A Journey Through Time...

Newport Beach pumping plant #1 was constructed around 1906 on Bushard Street in the Santa Ana River basin. Water was pumped to the City's first reservoir located at what is now the Utilities Yard on 16th Street.





In 1923, the plant underwent reconstruction for electrical power, as well as equipping the facility with bulkheads that were placed across the door to keep flooding incidents to a minimum. As the Orange County population grew, the well field was depleted and this plant was abandoned in 1934. Additional wells were drilled inland; however, by 1958 all of the wells succumbed to salt water intrusion and Newport Beach had to look for an alternate water source. This led to the City obtaining water from the Metropolitan Water District who brought water to Orange County from Northern California and Colorado.

MADD Honors the Work of NBPD OFFICERS

Several Police Department employees have been recognized by Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD) for the volume of Driving Under the Influence arrests they made in 2015. Officers who made 25 or more DUI arrests were recognized with the Deuce Award; those who arrested more than 100 impaired drivers were recognized with the Century Award. In the words of the MADD organization, "We cannot overemphasize the importance of this accomplishment. For officers, whose official responsibilities include so much more than DUI enforcement, arresting dangerous drivers with such consistency is remarkable."

Officer Neal Schuster (pictured, right) made 103 DUI arrests in 2015. He was honored with the Century Award at a luncheon hosted by MADD and the California Office of Traffic Safety (OTS), held at the Great Wolf Lodge in Garden Grove on March 24.

Four NBPD officers qualified for the Deuce Award: Officers Jacob Khor (34 arrests), William Hume (29 arrests), Matthew Biagi (28 arrests) and Paul Riscalla (27 arrests).

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, an average of 28 people per day are killed as a result of drunk driving traffic collisions, and



drunk driving costs the United States over \$130 billion per year. We are grateful to these officers for their diligent work in combating DUIs in our City.

CONGRATULATIONS TO THE NBPD EXPLORERS

Earlier this month, Explorer Post 1050 competed in the Fifth Annual Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department Explorer Competition. This year's competition brought together 33 teams and a total of 337 Explorers from throughout California and Arizona.

Our Department sent a group of 16 selected Explorers to compete in this event.

The hard work and dedication of these youth-Explorer Advisors and Comte. Fletcher, Gilbert. Maslin and Vincelet—is evident in the results. Our team received an incredible five first-place finishes, five second-place finishes, two fourth-place finishes and one fifth place finish. That adds up to fifteen total awards, the highest number received by our Explorer Post in recent We memory. are tremendously proud of their accomplishments.


JOIN US AT JAVIER'S FOR THE 2016 SPECIAL OLYMPICS TIP-A-COP EVENT

A Piece of History: Redwood Water Pipes

Recent trenching to replace aged water and sewer lines in Newport Beach has uncovered remnants of earlier underground water pipes made from redwood staves and wire binding. Senior Inspector Mike St. Clair is shown at right with a wood pipe stave found in 2014 during the reconstruction of sewer mains along Dover Drive. Wood piping was used for the transmission of water from Long Beach to Laguna Beach through Newport Beach.

Wooden pipes, similar in construction technique as used for wooden barrels, were used in the late 1880s and early 1900s as a modern means to bring water to cities. Tapered, wedge-shaped staves formed a hollow cylinder and were held in place by metal bands or wiring. Water pressure kept the pipe tight and insulated. Redwood pipes did not require expansion joints and did not experience the ill effects of electrolysis, scaling and corrosion that were common to metal pipes at that time.

Wooden pipes were replaced with cast iron pipes in the 1920's.

What Are Those Black Tubes on The Street?

Have you driven over black tubes on the street and wondered what they are?

These tubes connect to a counter box on the side of the road. The counter box collects information such as volume, vehicle classification, and speed. On an annual basis, Public Works collects 24-hour traffic volumes citywide, reviews the data for historical trends and uses them for traffic studies.

Newport Boulevard/32nd Street Update

A new public parking lot at Newport Boulevard and 32nd Street will open at the end of the month. This 32-stall parking lot replaces 26 curbside parking spaces previously on Newport Boulevard.



Public Works – A Well-Engineered Machine

Newport Beach's Tamura Shallow Well

The Public Works Department is in the process of rehabilitating two of the City's four water wells, which are all located in Fountain Valley. The picture at right depicts a video device entering the 270-foot-deep Tamura Shallow well. Upon completion of the initial video survey, this well will undergo rehabilitation which includes wire brushing, air jetting, pumping development and testing. A post-rehabilitation video survey will be conducted for comparison purposes, prior to reinstalling the pump and motor. Similar to many other mechanical devices, water wells require regular maintenance in order to perform efficiently.

If all goes as planned, both of the rehabilitated wells will be performing like new.

What you can expect to see the week of April 25, 2016

The contractor will continue to work on the following activities:

- Layout and measure locations for the temporary steel bridge that will be installed over the Grand Canal along Balboa Avenue.
- Continue the relocation of utilities along Park Avenue.

NIGHT WORK is scheduled for Monday, April 25 from 9pm to 5am.

In conjunction with the City's scheduled night work to repair a water valve, the project contractor will cap a segment of the water line between Marine Avenue and the Grand Canal on Balboa Island.

- Water shut-off: Businesses will experience temporary water shut-off during this work.
- Alley Access: Residents, businesses and emergency responders will have access at all times to the alley between the Grand Canal and Marine Avenue from Balboa Avenue.
- Noise: Noise will be experienced from back-up alarms, work crews voices and other related equipment.
- Lighting: Additional lighting is required for the safety of the contractor.
- Park Avenue: Intermittent lane restrictions and/or flagmen may be used on Park Avenue.

Friday, April 29

The contractor has planned to cap a segment of the temporary water line at Balboa Avenue between the Grand Canal and Abalone Avenue on Little Balboa Island.

- Water shut-off: Residents will experience temporary water shut-off during this work. A separate notification will follow this notice with the shut-off time.
- Alley Access: Residents, businesses and emergency responders will have access at all times to the alley between the Grand Canal and Abalone Avenue from Balboa Avenue.

Upcoming activities for the week of May 2, 2016

The contractor will continue to work on the following activities:

- Continue the relocation of utilities along Park Avenue.
- Layout and measure locations for the temporary steel bridge that will be installed over the Grand Canal along Balboa Avenue.

In the works

Fabrication of the temporary steel bridge is in process. The main span (middle section of the bridge) is expected to be delivered the week of May 9, 2016.



*Project schedule is subject to change based upon field conditions and uncontrollable factors such as weather.

- ♣ U.S. Cost Guard safety zone notices with fines are posted along the Grand Canal just north of Balboa Avenue and south of Park Avenue.




