Our Annual Survey Results are Back!



Building Division - Winner of the 2016 National ICC Community Service Award!



The Building Division is the recent recipient of the 2016 International Code Council (ICC) Community Service Award. The award is presented when circumstances warrant a need to recognize meritorious service by an organization that promotes public health, safety and welfare by initiating activities or actions which are considered to be above and beyond the normal expectations. The Building Division staff was recognized for their hard work and dedication to the community. This is truly an accomplishment to receive this award at the national level.

2016 California Codes of Construction - Proposed City Amendments and Significant Changes

The Building Division hosted their final seminar of the year. The seminar focused on the 2016 California Construction Codes and proposed city amendments. Over 85 design architects and engineers attended. The new codes will be introduced to the City Council on November 8, 2016, with an implementation date of January 3, 2017.

Request for Proposal Released for Permitting System Replacement

Last week, the Community Development Department and the IT Division released a Request for Proposal for the full replacement of City's legacy permitting software - Permits Plus. For the past twenty-plus years, Permits Plus has been the key software to track all permit and development activity for Building, Planning, Code Enforcement, and Public Works. Although the current system has served its purpose, the City has outgrown the software's ability to keep up with new technology. The City is interested in advancing to the next generation of permitting software in order to improve internal efficiencies and expand online services for the public's use. All proposals are due November 18, 2016.

Balboa Performing Arts Theater

At the October 11, 2016 meeting, the City Council unanimously (6-0) approved the sale of the Balboa Performing Arts Theater to LAB Holding LLC for \$1 million. The theater, located at 707 E. Balboa Blvd, was built in the late 1920s and is structurally deficient. Shaheen Sadeghi, President of LAB Holding LLC,

intends to bring the building up to current code standards and use the building as a theatertype venue for live performances. A deed restriction on the property will limit the use to theater or performing arts center with limited retail use.

Promoting Water Conservation

Brian Contino of Code Enforcement and Shane Burckle of Public Works were invited to give a presentation at the Philanthropic Education Organization on October 17, 2016 in the Eastbluff community.

They presented information on where Newport Beach gets its water, Level 2 restrictions, and the enforcement process. Questions from the group ranged from "how does the drought affect California" to "how do we avoid receiving enforcement



letters and fines." The water conservation website and phone application updates were discussed. The philanthropic group was thankful for the City's efforts and is equipped with water conservation tips and information to distribute to the rest of the community.

Community Cleanup Project Recognized

Code Enforcement Officer John Murray and Pastor Dan Wendell of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church were recognized at the October 11, 2016 City Council meeting for their leadership in a community cleanup project. A resident on the Balboa Peninsula was physically unable to address property maintenance issues on his property. Rather than using traditional enforcement tools, Code Enforcement Officer Murray partnered with St. Andrew's to help the owner clean up the property. The event was a complete success. The owner was extremely grateful for the City's and Church's assistance. Thanks again to Code Enforcement Officer Murray and all the volunteers from St. Andrews Church for their participation in this event.

Moody's Upgrades 2010 Certificates of Participation Rating to Aa1

On October 11, 2016, Moody's Investors Services upgraded its underlying rating of the 2010 Civic Center Certificates of Participation (2010 COPS) to Aa1 from Aa2. Moody's originally assigned the 2010 COPS a rating of Aa2 in October of 2010, at the time the COPS were issued. A rating is a measure of the credit quality and safety of a security, based on the issuer's financial condition. This upgrade is significant because it confirms that the City's financial performance has been strong year after year and is positioned to continue this way. In fact, the Moody's release states that the City has a "very strong credit profile," which is a major factor in determining rating actions of securities. The rating applies to \$110.5 million of COPS. The Aa1 rating is one notch lower than the City's Aaa Issuer Rating.

GFOA Better Budgeting Seminar

Budget staff from Finance and Public Works listened to the Government Finance Officers Association webinar on Better Budgeting earlier this month. This year's topics were setting up a long-term planning process, creating a truly effective capital budgeting process, better assessing the potential impact of changes in service level, making better decisions on the appropriate levels of fees and charges, designing more effective measures of performance, and improving the process of budgeting for salaries and wages. We were pleased to learn that we are already doing some of the recommended actions, but we picked up a few ideas that we hope to implement in the upcoming budget process, which will be starting soon.

Treasury Report Update

The September 2016 Treasury Report is available on the City's website at: www.newportbeachca.gov/treasury.

As of September, the City's portfolio totaled just over \$213 million, from all sources. Roughly \$30 million of this portfolio is highly liquid, meaning that it is available for cash flows associated with day-to-day operations and cash funding of major construction expenditures.

The medium-term portfolio (\$172 million) has a weighted average effective maturity of 1.79 years. The total return for the medium-term portfolio for the trailing twelve months was 1.21%. This return compares favorably to our benchmark for the same period, the BAML 1-3 Year Treasury index which returned 0.88%.



Every year, the California Professional Firefighters has a Memorial Service for firefighters that succumbed to an illness or injury sustained from active duty. This year, Newport Beach Fire Department added Battalion Chief George Pearce to the wall in Sacramento.



George Pearce was hired by Newport Beach Fire Department in 1973 and would go on to bravely serve for more than three decades. Over the course of his career, George rose to the rank of Battalion Chief and was an instrumental member of the department's HazMat team. Outside of the firehouse, George loved to be active, enjoying golf, skiing, softball, Jeeping, pickleball and traveling. George passed away in 2014, following a battle with jobrelated cancer.

Assistant Fire Chief Chip Duncan presented the flag to the Pearce family during the impactful ceremony. He was joined by Battalion Chiefs Jeff Boyles, Brian McDonough, and Justin Carr, Firefighter



Bobby Salerno, Captain Ed Wick and Paramedic Steve Martin. Governor Brown spoke to hundreds attendees honoring fallen firefighters. The sacrifice's Chief Pearce made during his career is a testament to his character and his commitment to the residents and visitors in Newport Beach.

The event featured live rescue and fire demonstrations, along with apparatus displays, including our antique fire engine. Once again this year, our firefighters also provided a live burn demonstration, which



really made a hot day even hotter. Visitors experienced a genuine sense of the heat firefighters must face when working to extiguish uncontrolled fires.

Fire Captain Ron Gutierrez was the Master of Ceremonies this year, and he did an outstanding job. This event was very well attended, and we are already looking forward to next year!



Training Services

Training Services, along with Human Resources, conducted a promotional Engineer's Test. The test was held at Newport Beach Fire Station 7, and seven Firefighters participated in the testing process. Flu Season is here! Make sure you receive your flu vaccinations this year. Our firefighters are in the process of receiving their annual flu shots, provided in-house by the EMS Division nurses – Chief Thompson and Lauren Lee.

In the course of their profession, firefighters are often exposed to contagious diseases that could cause them to become ill, sometimes seriously. In response to that risk, all Newport Beach firefighters received their annual training on Communicable (contagious) Diseases from Chief Thompson this month. The topics covered included disease recognition, procedures for



preventing the spread of contagious diseases and prevention measures so they do not become ill themselves from those diseases. Communicable diseases covered in the training (and that firefighters can be exposed to in their daily work) include the flu, Whooping Cough, Meningitis, TB, Measles, MRSA, Scabies, and the blood borne diseases HIV and Hepatitis. Training did not cover all of the contagious bugs firefighters have the potential to be exposed to, but it hit on a healthy dose of the most common ones.

Healthy Roasted Pumpkin Seeds - Yummmmm!

Before throwing out your jack-o'-lantern's innards, use the pumpkin seeds to make a healthy snack. High in plant sterols and phytochemicals, pumpkin seeds aid in lowering cholesterol and promote good prostate health. On top of that, they are also a good source of protein and fiber, making them a great, healthy snack!

While a basic recipe is a nice treat, get creative by adding metabolism-boosting spices to your recipe. While cinnamon and a little brown sugar make for a tasty treat, throw in a pinch of cayenne for a creative twist and lil' spice!

INGREDIENTS:

- 2 cups pumpkin seeds that have been rinsed and dried
- 1/2 tablespoon olive oil or melted coconut oil
- 2 teaspoons spice mixture
- Salt to taste

DIRECTIONS:

- 1. Preheat oven to 350°F.
- 2. In a large bowl, toss pumpkin seeds with oil, salt, and seasoning.
- 3. Spread pumpkin seeds evenly onto a baking sheet (1 layer).
- 4. Bake for about 20 minutes, until the seeds are crisp, shaking the pan every few minutes while roasting.
- 5. Remove from the oven and, if desired, add more spices.



Making sure the WAN works

The City has a WAN that is the backbone of all that we do. What is a WAN? A WAN, short for "Wide Area Network," is a telecommunications/computer network that links together many computers and facilities from across a larger geographic area. The Internet is a worldwide version of a WAN. Our City has a WAN that connects all of our City Facilities together. Through this network City staff can access their email, the Internet, Finance and Payroll, Permitting software, and all the other software systems needed to serve the Community.

Your cITy team spends a lot of time both maintaining this network and working on design changes to ensure it is both fast and reliable. We use a combination of Internet Service Providers (ISP), like Cox and Time Warner, Fiber – including the Public Works traffic signal communication fiber system, and even microwave links to move our data around the City. These links connect every Fire Station, Library and Recreation facility to our City Hall site. The last several years have seen upgrades at many of our locations so that they have both a faster connection path to make systems run faster, but also reliable backup connections in case the main link goes down.

One could ask, why should the City have its own network to connect facilities when it could instead only use ISP companies to provide the connections? Two reasons:

- 1. Cost savings. Our microwave links have a cost to install of roughly \$15,000 per pair of links that last eight years, but then there is no annual cost for the use of the link. In contrast a 1 Gbps connection to City Hall from an ISP provider would cost over \$15,000 per year (total cost over \$120,000 in eight years). With seven active links in the City, we will save hundreds of thousands of dollars over the eight-year life of the current equipment. Our use of the Traffic signal fiber lines to connect additional facilities adds no annual cost and creates additional savings.
- 2. Reliability uptime. Our City network only serves our City needs and is not impacted by other customers' uses like a large ISP provider can be. In the event Cox or Time Warner has an outage, the City network will still be operational. Alternatively, we ensure all City facilities have

backup links which are provided by ISP providers so in the event the City network has a failure; the ISP connection will be the live link to allow business to carry on.

Specific WAN projects completed/underway

- The City's 320 foot communication tower at the Utilities Yard is a key component of the microwave network. Now that the tower is replaced, we will be upgrading the microwave links on the tower that connect the different regions of the City. These tower links are a crucial component of our WAN structure as it connects the western side of the City to City Hall.
- A microwave link was also added to Fire Station #2 to connect it to the network. This solution provided faster connection compared to the limited speeds provided by ISP providers in the area.
- We have run fiber lines to Mariners Library/Fire Station #6, Marina Park, Fire Station #8, Big Canyon Reservoir, and between Fire Station #3 and the Police Station to replace ISP provider connections and/or increase network speed.
- These link upgrades require new switch and router hardware to properly handle the increased network speed. We have replaced six switch/router devices at various sites.

Software and hardware systems continue to improve and be upgraded which results in a demand for faster data connections. Upgrades to links are needed to make sure the network stays fast and responsive. So next time you use a City computer or access a City system somewhere you can thank the WAN for making it all possible.

MISAC Quality Award for cITy

The cITy team was recently honored by receiving a Quality IT Practices Award from the Municipal Information Systems Association of California (MISAC). This signifies the achievements of the team in providing outstanding IT operations and service.

Confined Space Entry Training

On Wednesday, October 19, MOD held its second Confined Space Entry Training session at the Utilities Yard. The purpose of this type of training is to bring awareness to the hazards and procedures associated with confined space entry and to provide managers with the basic instruction necessary to implement a confined space entry program. This class was instructed by Greg Shreenan from Trench Shoring. He is a Current Procedural Technology and Confined Space Entry Certified Trainer, and is a member of the National Utility Contractors Association.



CDM Centennial Clock Tower Repair

MOD recently received several calls regarding the Centennial Clock Tower in Corona del Mar not displaying the correct time. Upon further investigation by both staff and a local contractor, "Tick Tock Tony," it was discovered that the salt air environment had damaged the control panel beyond repair and a new one was ordered. Upon arrival, the new control panel was installed and the correct time is now being displayed on all four faces of the clock.



Goldenrod Footbridge Facelift

Every few years, the historic Goldenrod Footbridge in Corona del Mar receives a facelift from our Landscape Division. As part of this treatment, staff and contractors removed and replaced plants that have declined, and repaired and repainted the planter boxes. Landscape Supervisor Paul Ramirez coordinated the project with the City maintenance contractors. Job well done!





<u>Damaged Mariners Mile Sign Replaced</u>

In August, the Mariners Mile sign on West Coast Highway, east of the Arches Bridge was damaged from a traffic accident. The repair took approximately eight weeks, and cost \$13,098. Restitution will be sought from the party at fault and/or his insurance company.





The Field Maintenance Division oversees all traffic signs and street marking maintenance activities in the City. This encompasses approximately 20,000 regulatory signs, and additional specialty signs such as this.

Balboa Island Storm Drain Line Replacements

During a recent monthly inspection of storm drains on Balboa Island, staff noted two damaged storm drain lines on the bayfront beaches: Marine Avenue at South Bay Front, and Balboa Avenue at East Bay Front.



The on-call storm drain contractor, GCI, was called in to remove and replace the damaged corrugated steel pipe during the low tide period.



The replacement pipes, constructed of heavy duty PVC, should hold up to boats bumping into them. Once the new pipes were connected to the seawall, concrete collars with anchors were poured over the pipe to prevent them from floating when the tide rises.



The Police Department would like to share the following tips with parents and Trick-or-Treaters of all ages:

Know Your Child's Plans

If you will not be with your child, these items are important to discuss in advance:

- Establish a specific route for trick-or-treating (so that you can find your child, if necessary).
- Discuss who will be accompanying your child while he or she is trick-or-treating.
- Establish a time that your child should return home.

Focus on Costume Safety

- Makeup is safer than a mask (which can obscure vision).
- Costumes and wigs should be flame-resistant.
- Reflective strips and bright clothing will increase visibility, along with a flashlight.
- Comfortable, well-fitting shoes prevent tripping and other hazards.
- Props and accessories should be made of cardboard, so they will not injure your child if he or she should fall down.

Follow Critical Safety Tips

- Trick-or-Treat in your own neighborhood.
- Trick-or-Treat in a group of two or more, accompanied by a parent or adult.
- Stick to well-lighted areas.
- Stay on sidewalks and look both ways when crossing the street. Never cross the street between parked cars or mid-block.
- Do not allow your child to enter <u>ANY</u> house.
- Parents must inspect all treats. Discard fruit or any candy in loose or torn wrappings.

Talk to your Child about Law Enforcement

- Discuss the importance of respecting the property of others.
- Advise your child that throwing eggs and water balloons or spraying shaving cream is inappropriate and could be illegal.
- Curfew in Newport Beach is 10 p.m.
- All fireworks are illegal in Newport Beach.

If you should discover anything wrong with the "treats" brought home, please call the NBPD at 949-644-3717 so other parents can be warned and those responsible can be caught.

NOTABLE ARREST

Man Arrested for Parole Warrant and Narcotics Charge, Linked to 11 Other Incidents in Newport Beach

On Friday, October 14, 2016, at 7:30 a.m., Newport Beach Police Officers responded to the 2600 block of Bungalow Place in response to multiple calls of a suspicious person in the area. One caller reported that a man had approached a home that was under construction and had repeatedly accessed a dumpster on the property. Other callers reported that the same man was seen entering several neighbors' yards and peering into windows.

The responding officers located a man matching the subject's description nearby in the

2500 block of Sea Lane. The subject (later identified as Cannon Timothy Torres) was in possession of wire cutters and believed to be under the influence of methamphetamine. Further investigation also revealed that there was an outstanding no-bail Parole Violation warrant for his arrest. Torres was arrested for the warrant and narcotics charge and transported to the Newport Beach Jail for processing.




Meanwhile, the Police Department continued to receive reports of suspicious and criminal activity in the area. A garage burglary was reported in the 1100 block of White Sails Way; the loss included a power tool, which was subsequently recovered from the dumpster that Torres accessed shortly before his arrest. Several items were stolen from three unlocked vehicles in the 2800 and 2900 blocks of Setting Sun Drive and the 1200 block of Sandpoint Way; a number of these stolen items were recovered from Torres at the time of his arrest.

Several other incidents occurred during the same timeframe and in close proximity to the crimes listed above. A 2012 green Honda CR-V was stolen from the 1200 block of Sandpoint Way and located by officers outside of a nearby elementary school. The same school reported a burglary from their music room. Miscellaneous property was found abandoned in the 2800 block of Pebble Drive and the 1100 block of White Sails Way, including two car keys. A bicycle was stolen from a garage in the 2500 block of Bungalow Place and recovered in the 2600 block of the same street. And, on Saturday morning, two handguns were found along with miscellaneous narcotics paraphernalia at the intersection of Harbor View Drive and Marguerite Avenue. An officer was able to track these firearms to an unreported burglary in the 2700 block of Pebble Drive.

I extend my gratitude to each citizen who contacted our Dispatch Center to report this suspicious activity. Thanks to that timely information, officers were able to locate and arrest Torres without incident. After thorough investigations by field personnel, we believe that Torres is responsible for most, if not all, of the listed crimes. Detectives will continue to investigate these cases and intend to seek additional charges, including Possession of Burglary Tools, Possession of Stolen Property, Petty Theft from a Motor Vehicle, Residential Garage Burglary and Felon in Possession of a Firearm.

Given the number of incidents that occurred between Thursday evening and Friday morning, it is possible that there are other undiscovered or unreported crimes that took place before Torres was contacted by officers. We are asking anyone in the area who believes that they were the victim of a crime, or who has found unexplained property in their neighborhood, to contact Detective Brian Schlottach at 949-644-3799 or bschlottach@nbpd.org.


Construction to Begin on the Big Canyon Water Quality and Restoration Project

The long anticipated Big Canyon Project (Phase I) is underway!



Public Works Will:

- Treat storm water runoff from Jamboree Road through installation of a vegetated infiltration basin to filter storm runoff before releasing back into Big Canyon Creek.
- Stabilize the creek and flood plain through vegetated revetments.
- Protect wildlife by capturing high concentration selenium seeps and diverting these seep flows to the sanitary sewer.
- Restore historic riparian habitat by removing six acres of non-native vegetation and replanting with native plant species.
- Enhance public access within the Big Canyon Nature Park.



The Phase 1 construction cost is \$1.8 million and is funded by grants. The project is anticipated to be completed in Spring 2017 followed by a 4-month plant establishment and maintenance period.

Cameo Shores Pavement Reconstruction is Nearing Completion



Public Works is finishing the final phase of construction on the Cameo Shores Pavement Reconstruction project. This project consisted of removing and reconstructing the existing pavement street and deteriorated concrete sidewalks, curbs and driveways, as well as installing curb access ramps to meet current with Disabilities Americans (ADA) standards within the entire tract.

As shown in the photo, the sub-contractor **Superior Striping** was on site to install the final striping. All work is on schedule to be completed by the end of the month, which is one week ahead of schedule. The Contractor, All American Asphalt, did a fantastic job!

Public Works staff also worked very closely with the residents of Cameo Shores and would like to thank them for their patience throughout the process. Staff is pleased with

the final product that you've been awaiting for many years!

Also, staff appreciates the team work with the Municipal Operations Department and the Code Enforcement Department in helping to make this project successful.





Slip Rentals at Marina Park

General Construction Permit Training



Public Works – Fnvironmental Section hosted a refresher course on the State's General Construction Permit (GCP). The Public Works and Community Development Inspectors, Engineers and Managers benefited from this training. The GCP requires a storm water pollution prevention plan when a construction project has one or more acres of disturbed soil. This type of construction requires the developer to obtain coverage under the General Permit for Discharges of Storm Water associated with construction activity. The Public Works Inspectors and Building Inspectors are to be commended. Their inspection efforts assure

the sediment control plans are followed and sediment and debris from the job site does not enter the storm drains, or ultimately, the ocean.


