

IRS 1099 Forms and Processing Webinar

Accounts Payable staff recently participated in a webinar to review IRS 1099 forms and processing. Most years, staff relies on IRS publications due to the lack of availability of meaningful training on the topic. Since the penalties for not preparing the forms correctly are expensive, additional training is necessary every few years to ensure that the 1099 forms are still being correctly prepared and that the vendors receive accurate and timely forms. This year, staff anticipates issuing the 2016 IRS 1099 forms to approximately 450 vendors.



Sales and Use Tax Rate Decreases 0.25 Percent Effective January 1, 2017



Effective January 1, 2017, the Orange County sales tax rate will drop to 7.75 percent. The reason for the decrease is related to Proposition 30, *The Schools and Local Public Safety Protection Act of 2012.* Proposition 30 was approved by California's voters in November 2012 to temporarily increase the sales and use tax by 0.25 percent. The sales and use tax imposed by Proposition 30 expires December 31, 2016.

New Medical Director

The Newport Beach Fire Department has contracted with Dr. Shira A. Schlesinger, MD, MPH, as our EMS Medical Director. She comes to us with valuable EMS experience and demonstrates strong support for fire-based EMS. She will be assisting us with Quality Assurance projects, Education, Community Paramedicine, as well as being a valuable resource.

Dr. Schlesinger is a practicing Emergency Medicine physician. After graduating medical school at the University of California, San Diego, she completed her residency in Emergency Medicine at LAC-USC, and Fellowship in EMS and Disaster Medicine at the University of California, Irvine. Dr. Schlesinger currently works full time as the Medical Director for the Paramedic Training Institute of the Los Angeles County EMS Agency, and as Emergency Medicine faculty at Harbor-UCLA Medical Center. She speaks on EMS topics for both pre-hospital and hospital providers. Her research and professional interests include pre-hospital trauma care, Community Paramedicine, and fostering critical thinking in the pre-hospital arena. She is a member of the ACEP EMS Committee, the California EMS for Children Technical Advisory Committee, and serves as the EMS Section Editor for the Western Journal of Emergency Medicine.

Dr. Schlesinger will be conducting field ride alongs on a monthly basis.

The dredging project continues at the Santa Ana River basin. At the end of November, a pipe was installed at 38th Street. It comes out from the sand at the berm and runs out to a large yellow mooring offshore. The pipe is currently on the sea floor. Signs have been posted, as well as the pipe reading "Keep Away Please." We want to remind surfers, swimmers and beach goers to stay clear of this pipe as it can move and rise into the air when purged. We have lifeguards watching it during the day and that is a good thing since on December 7, the pipe separated from the mooring and came to shore. Our lifeguards kept the public away until it was secured.



In November, Newport Beach Fire Department, Marine Operations was certified by the United States Lifesaving Association as an advanced open water lifeguard agency. The certification will be effective through November 2019.

Tuesday evening, December 6, was the conclusion of the first Fire Control 3B class put on by the Newport Beach Fire Department. The level of dedication and enthusiasm by everyone involved was top notch and our newest firefighters will benefit tremendously from the training.

Fire operations wishes everyone a safe and happy holiday season. To keep you and your loved ones safe please keep the following in mind for the holidays:

CHRISTMAS TREES can remain relatively fire safe if you follow these simple steps:

- When selecting your live Christmas tree, choose a fresh one with green needles.
- Recut the trunk at least two inches above the old cut as soon as you get it home. This allows it to continue to pull moisture into its foliage.
- Put the trunk in water immediately after it is recut.
 Moisture is the key to keeping the tree fresh and
 thereby enhancing its fire resistance. If the tree will be
 kept outside for a few days, stand it in a bucket of
 water until you are ready to bring it indoors.



- Check the water levels daily. Never let the water level go below the bottom of the trunk. Commercial floral preservatives can also be added to the water to help keep the tree fresh
- Position your tree at least three feet away from sources of heat. Avoid placing any tree, live or artificial, near a heater outlet, wood stove or fireplace. Put it in the coolest location possible.
- Never leave a lighted tree unattended.
- Remove the tree immediately after the holidays. Even a properly cared for live tree will eventually die. Take it to a recycle center or leave for your refuse collector.

LIGHTS & DECORATIONS

- Choose decorations that are flame resistant or flame retardant.
- Keep decorations away from heat sources, windows and doors.
- Properly install your holiday lights. Use lights that have the label of an independent testing laboratory.
- Be sure to use indoor lights inside, and outdoor lights outside.
- Make sure all electrical cords have no frayed or cracked wires or broken sockets. Do not attempt to repair a worn light set! Throw it away and purchase a new one.
- Do not overload electrical outlets.
- Do not link more than three light strands, unless the directions indicate it is safe.
- Do not leave lights turned on for prolonged periods or unattended.
- Keep your exits clear by keeping decorations away from windows and doors.
- In addition to being shatterproof and shock resistant, LED lights produce almost no heat, making them safe to touch and **greatly reducing the risk of fire.**


RETIREMENT SEMINAR

Cows4Camp Update



A new art exhibit was installed in the Central Library this week featuring a collection of paintings by local artist Mark Leysen. The art exhibit is titled "Transitions" and will be on display on both levels of the Central Library from December 5 through January 27. Mr. Leysen will host an artist talk on December 15 at 7 p.m. in the Central Library Friends Room.

Mark Leysen is an Orange County artist whose paintings are rooted in abstract expressionism. His strong sense of color and rhythm shapes the compositions, while the more formal aspects of geometric forms give balance and harmony.

Upgrade of City Landscapes

It is our aim to continue identifying areas needing beautification with water usage reduction in mind when choosing plant pallet.

Recently, Landscape Division staff coordinated with Mariposa Landscapes on the relandscaping of **Jasmine Park**. This included removing unnecessary grass and replacing it with drought-tolerant plants, including: Agave Striata, Cotyledon orbiculata, and Vitex trifolia 'Purpurea.'

Jasmine Park



Via Lido Median





The Via Lido median landscape between Newport Boulevard to Via Oporto also recently received a facelift. The plant pallet selected for this location included Aloe 'Little Gem,' 'Long Fingers,' Callistemon 'Little John,' and Euphorbia 'Sticks of Fire' surrounding the existing palms. Staff designed the landscaping, and plant installation was performed by City maintenance contractor Park West Landscape.

New landscaping around the **Newport Theatre Arts Center** was also recently installed. Landscape and Recreation Divisions worked together to remove the old plant material and replaced it with plants that are low-water-use. In addition, 20-year-old landscaping was removed and replaced at two parkway areas. This upgrade was a much needed improvement.







Continuing Education

Groundsworker II Daniel Tovar recently added Category B Landscape Maintenance to his Qualified Pesticide Applicator Certificate License. This is in addition to his current license with categories including Right of Way and Aquatic. Working on the Pesticide/Project Crew, Daniel is our primary pesticide applicator. He applies herbicides at the staff-maintained parks, as well as injects, bark bands, and sprays trees for the City Arborist.

On Thursday, MOD held two Chainsaw Training sessions at the Corporation Yard. Approximately 70 crew members attended the training led by Jose Hernandez from Stilh USA, Pacific Division. The training focused on the safe operation and basic maintenance of chainsaws, and the use of personal protective equipment.



Back Bay Drive







Field Maintenance staff oversees the maintenance of Back Bay Drive, which includes signs, striping, drainage, street, and shoulder repairs. Back Bay can turn into a muddy playground during the rainy season, attracting four wheelers and ATV (all-terrain vehicle) riders. Staff added 60 tons of road base and boulders to the shoulder to deter this activity while still allowing pedestrian access the walking path. Forty-five tons of decomposed granite (DG) was also added to the shoulder for a smoother walking surface.

New Pump Enclosure

The Storm Drain Division has a permanently stationed pump located at 44th Street and River Avenue where a 36" sluice gate, which is closed during high tides, has been recently replaced. This flood prone area is protected by a 2250-gallon-per-minute pump that is set up behind a vinyl fence. This fence has been in place for nine years, and after last weekend's Santa Ana wind event, the fence was damaged and required replacement. Storm Drain staff, Ray Gonzalez, James Moureaux, and Ruben Martinez installed the new enclosure this week. After seeing what worked and what didn't work over the years, the trio designed an enclosure to withstand both on-shore and Santa Ana wind events for many years to come.







Recent Main Break

On Wednesday, November 30, at 3:00 a.m., Utilities staff responded to a 6 inch cast iron pipe water main break near the corner of Cliff Drive and Irvine Avenue. In order to make the repair and reduce water loss, the water main was isolated, affecting water

service to 32 homes and Ensign Junior High School. Considering it was a school day, City staff made it a priority to supply the school with water by providing a by-pass line to the school. This enabled the school to have water until the main was repaired and back in full service at 8:30 a.m. Once the main was repaired, the focus turned to the extensive street damage caused by the main break. The Street Maintenance Division repaired the street and reopened Cliff Drive and Irvine Avenue to through traffic by late afternoon.

CONGRATULATIONS, VOLUNTEERS!

At the most recent meeting of our Volunteers in Policing Program, I was honored to congratulate several of our volunteers on reaching significant milestones.



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Dennis Biggs, Jim Engel, Laurence Sandu and Leo Vortouni were each recognized for donating 500 hours of service to the Department. We also celebrated two recent anniversaries: Jerry Scarboro has been with the Volunteer Program for 10 years and Bill Sinclair for 15 years.

HENRY UPDATE

As many of you may remember, Henry was abandoned in Newport Beach on May 12. He had an enormous tumor on his side and an E. coli bladder infection. Despite his health issues, Henry's winning personality won the hearts of our Animal Control Officers and shelter volunteers.

After a three-hour surgery, the 42-pound tumor was successfully removed from Henry's side. The vet and surgeon generously donated the majority of the surgery costs, only charging for 90 minutes of their time. Part of Henry's health care costs was also offset by generous donations and a \$500 grant.

The biopsy results on Henry's tumor showed that it *was* cancerous, but non-metastatic (meaning that it had not spread anywhere else) and that the surgical team had removed the entire mass.

Unfortunately, a later check-up revealed that Henry had developed another tumor. Henry started treatment and moved out of our shelter and into a foster home so he could be surrounded by all the love, care and attention that a golden retriever could ever want. He has continued to make occasional visits to the shelter and the police station. We have all become so attached to Henry (and his infectious good nature) that we cannot bear to let him go.



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Henry will live out the rest of his life in a loving home surrounded by people who adore him and his fellow rescue "brothers and sisters."

Since Henry came into the care of the Police Department, our Animal Control Officers have been investigating the circumstances of his abandonment. After a thorough investigation, they identified Henry's former owner. Their complete investigation had been forwarded to the Orange County District Attorney's Office for review.

We are so grateful for all of the positive thoughts, well-wishes and support that Henry and our staff has received throughout his treatment. We also thank the District Attorney's Office for their partnership in ensuring Henry's owner is held responsible for her actions.

CHILDREN'S CHRISTMAS PARTY

Last weekend, our staff gathered their families together at Goat Hill Junction in Costa Mesa to ring in the holiday season. The kids enjoyed train rides, a bounce house and a visit from Mr. and Mrs. Claus (as portrayed by retired Lifeguard Battalion Chief Eric Bauer and current NBPD Volunteer Maggie Hayes). This is a unique opportunity for employees—and their children—to socialize outside of the "office."










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A "BRIGHT IDEA" FROM OFFICER BRIAN MACK





Irvine Avenue Pavement & Median Rehabilitation Update

Work on the Irvine Avenue Pavement & Median Rehabilitation project continues to progress. The contractor has completed removals of existing median turf and concrete for the medians located between Santiago Drive and University Drive, including the installation of the new sub-drain system located between Private Road and 23rd Street.



working on installing a new water efficient irrigation system, after which weed abatement will begin in preparation for California drought tolerant plants and shrubs.



Tane closures (between 7 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.) will be required to complete this work as efficiently

and safely as possible. Public Works staff will monitor traffic conditions, phase work and adjust work hours and lane closures accordingly. The estimated completion date for the project is March 2017.

MacArthur Boulevard Pavement Rehabilitation Project Update



Construction activities started on November 28 as scheduled. The contractor, Hardy and Harper, has been removing and reconstructing deteriorated concrete improvements on the northbound side of MacArthur Boulevard. Most of the concrete work on the northbound side will be finished by December 9.

The contractor will continue with concrete improvements on the southbound side and along both sides of the medians throughout

December. To help alleviate daytime traffic congestion, portions of the work by the Ford Road/Bonita Canyon Drive intersection will be completed in the evening hours.

Additionally, our Traffic Management Center will be monitoring and adjusting the traffic signal timing as needed to help relieve congestion.

The project limits are from Coast Highway to Ford Road/Bonita Canyon Drive on MacArthur Boulevard and the project is partially funded by a Federal grant which required work during this season.



Asphalt paving work is still scheduled to occur in January 2017 after the holidays. Please note the traffic control cones and signs throughout the construction site. **Using alternate routes such as Jamboree Road or Newport Coast Drive during paving operations is strongly recommended**. Pavement striping and utility adjustments will follow immediately after paving operations.

We are on schedule to complete this project by March 2017.



Storm Drain Improvement Project- CDS Unit At Begonia Park

Two years ago, Public Works installed a large Continuous Deflective Separation (CDS) unit at Begonia Park. CDS units are installed underground as part of the storm drain

system and cycle runoff and storm water through a main designed chamber to capture trash and debris. units These capture thousands of pounds of trash annually - trash that would otherwise end up in Newport Bay. The project was paid for in part by an Orange County Transportation Authority (OCTA) grant. The project has been SO effective in capturing trash that OCTA is writing a feature article on our success!




Water Use Efficiency Meeting
