## **Have You Ever Considered the MetroLink?**



- Metrolink is the nation's 3rd largest commuter rail system with 388 unduplicated route miles.
- > It runs 2.7 million train miles per year and 449 million passenger miles per year.
- ➤ Metrolink has a very low tax subsidy of \$0.25 per passenger mile.

## LCP Certification Update

Friday, January 13 was a good day for the City. In San Luis Obispo, the California (CCC) Coastal Commission gave unanimous concurrence with the CCC Executive Director's determination that the City properly adopted the Local Coastal Program with the CCC's suggested modifications. This is the next to last step required to delegate Coastal Development Permit (CDP) authority to the City. The next step is a formality, the filing of a notice for certification of the LCP with the California Natural Resources Agency.

City and CCC staffs mutually agreed that the City could start accepting CDP applications on Monday, January 30, 2017. The Planning Division is updating our permit programs and procedures to include CDP applications, as well as finalizing the various informational handouts, application forms, and public notices that will need to be in place by that date. The City will also be conducting a workshop for architects, applicants, and other frequent Permit Center users to go over the CDP review procedures and answer any questions. The workshop will be held on Tuesday, January 24 at 2 p.m. in the Civic Center Community Room.

The next step in the certification process is the approval of the Post-LCP Certification Permit and Appeal Jurisdiction Map. This map is being prepared by the CCC's Mapping Unit and will set the boundaries of permit jurisdiction areas, appeals areas, and deferred certification areas.

A draft of the map is expected to be submitted to the City for review and comment later this month. The map is expected to be on the CCC's March meeting agenda, which will be held in the South Central Coast District (Santa Barbara and Ventura Counties).

## The Bays Apartments - 105 Affordable Units



In addition to the public benefit fee payment for the 524-unit Villas Fashion Island Apartments, the Irvine Company agreed to provide 105 residential units affordable to moderate-income households for a period of 30 years. These 105 units have been set aside within The Bays Apartments (Baywood, Bayport, and Bayview) located at 1 Baywood Drive and include a combination of one and two-bedroom units. The Irvine Company has begun initial leasing of these units to qualified households. Rents begin at \$1800 -\$1860 for one bedroom units and \$2093-\$2243 for two-bedroom units. ## **Dust Control**



Construction is up, development is booming, and the City is thriving! These are great things. However, more construction can often mean more dust. Following the rules is imperative to keeping oceans clean, the environment healthy, and neighbors happy. Code Enforcement responds to and often acts as liaisons to several other agencies when receiving dust-related complaints. For these reasons, staff regularly participates in construction management training. One recent example was the South Coast Air Quality Management District's Dust Control class. Staff learned more about current strategies for preventing,

mitigating, and controlling the release of airborne particulate matter (dust) emissions from earth-moving activities to help contractors stay on track. Additional topics discussed were Visible Emissions, Public Nuisance and Fugitive Dust regulations. The class was informative on how government agencies and private contracting companies can successfully work together during the developing stages and keep the peace between neighboring properties.

2017 brought with it some changes to Fire Administration. Following Chief Poster's retirement in December, Assistant Chief Chip Duncan was appointed to serve as the Acting Fire Chief. I was then appointed to fill his Assistant Chief of Operations position.

For those of you who do not know me, please allow me to introduce myself. My name is Jeff Boyles and I have been with the Newport Beach Fire Department since 2000. I worked as a Firefighter, Fire Paramedic, Fire Captain, Battalion Chief, and the Training Chief. Prior to my time with the NBFD, I worked for the San Bernardino County Fire Department from 1994-2000. I have lived in Newport Beach and currently in Huntington Beach with my wife Aimee and two sons (Braeden 14, and Ryan 12). My parents live on Balboa Peninsula in a condo that they bought in the 1980's, a rental, and have since retired there full time. Community engagement and customer service are very personal for me



and are a high priority. Acting Assistant Fire Chief Jeff Boyles

My day-to-day work will be to manage our Fire Department Operations, more specifically the four Battalion Chiefs (Training Chief Justin Carr, Nick Stocks, Brian McDonough and Acting Battalion Chief Nic Lucas). The Battalion Chiefs manage 10 Fire Captains each. Those 10 Fire Captains are spread throughout the city in eight different fire station locations. They are on the fire engines and ladder trucks, and supervise their crews in the field.

The Battalion Chiefs have perhaps one of the most complex and dynamic positions within the city. At any given time, they split time between the eight fire stations, the Civic Center, attend meetings, give direction, and perform administrative duties. They are also called out to emergency incidents and are expected to take charge of the operation. Those incidents usually occur in Newport Beach, but they can be called away to neighboring cities (Irvine, Laguna Beach, Costa Mesa and Huntington Beach) and sometimes on long-term deployments all over the State of California. My

job is to support them and give them the tools they need to accomplish their job, which is to support their crews, so that ultimately, we provide the best customer service and care to those who need our services.

I will provide updates in the coming newsletters about the operations of our fire department. We have many people doing lots of great work out there!

## Fallen Officers Memorial 5K

On January 18, 2017, Newport Beach Lifeguards Rob Williams, John Moore, Mike Ure, Gary Conwell and Adam Yacenda, along with Acting Assistant Fire Chief Jeff Boyles and Acting Fire Chief Chip Duncan, participated in The Fallen Officers Memorial 5k race held at the Orange County Sheriff's Regional Training Academy in Tustin. Officer Bob Henry died in the line of duty on April 13, 1995, after being shot on March 12, 1995 while checking on a drunk suspect.

The EMS Division of the Newport Beach Fire Department strives to ensure our community

receives the highest quality care possible. One of the ways we do this is by keeping our personnel up to date on the latest emergency medical techniques and education. In the closing months of 2016, the American Heart Association released



updated guidelines for Advanced Cardiac Life Support and Pediatric Advanced Life Support, known respectively as ACLS and PALS. These new guidelines are being taught to our Firefighter/Paramedics throughout January in ACLS and PALS recertification classes. The Fire Department requires all personnel operating in the capacity of a Paramedic to hold these

certifications (one of the few EMS providers in the County to do so). In doing this, we ensure they receive some of the same higher level education that emergency physicians receive.



Newport Beach Fire, including Lifeguards and Police, are developing a comprehensive Critical Incident Stress Management Program (CISM). Public Safety professionals are regularly placed in high stress situations, including situations that threaten their lives or they have horrific scenes to manage. To help promote

wellness, minimize the emotional impact of critical incidents, and increase resistance to this type of stress, we have contracted with a highly respected company to provide assistance to our Police, Fire, and Lifeguards. In addition, we are in the process of developing a Peer Support Program within each Public Safety department that will work collectively to support their member's wellness.



The Trauma Intervention Programs (TIP), a group of specialty-trained volunteers who provide support for victims of tragic events in Newport Beach, has been in place for three months now. To date, Fire and Police have activated their services for those in need in our community **14** times! TIP has responded 100% of the time when called, be it 2 a.m. on Sunday morning or Thanksgiving Day. Our citizens and visitors have benefited from the assistance of TIP volunteers following a home fire and the sudden death of a loved one.

## **Library Services**

The year is starting off with lots to talk about. The NBPL Foundation and the Friends of the Library have generously provided funds for an abundance of new and improved resources and programs.

## **Rosetta Stone Language Learning Suite**

We are excited to offer the popular language learning program, Rosetta Stone, giving customers free access to 30 different language courses at the beginning level. Library card holders can log on to Rosetta Stone from home or the library and take core lessons to build reading, writing, speaking and listening skills, as well as refine grammar, vocabulary and pronunciation. The NBPL Foundation generously provided the funds for Rosetta Stone. It will replace the Rocket Language database.

#### **New Wacom Tablet**

We have added a second Wacom drawing and design tablet in the Media Lab. The new Wacom is set up on MAC # 4, the Design workstation. Illustrators, graphic designers, fashion designers and product engineers use the Wacom table to sketch new ideas, edit images or create finished artwork. The Wacom Tablet is also a gift from the NBPL Foundation.

## **Newport History**

For Newport Beach history buffs, there will soon be a treasure-trove of digitized newspaper records available through the NBPL website, including copies of the Newport Balboa News Times dating back to October of 1940, and old editions of the Newport Harbor Ensign from 1948. Old microfilm for Daily Pilot issues is also being digitized to add to this historical collection.

## Children's Policy

The Board of Library Trustees approved a revision to the Children in the Library Policy Tuesday night. The two major points that were revised are:

- Raising the age of unattended children from 8 years old to 12 years
- Addressing unaccompanied adults' use of the Children's areas.

## Exhibition at the Central Library January 13 - February 15, 2017

For those wondering why there is a display of shoes on the upper lever of the Central Library, the audio tells the story - and it's not about fashion trends. *A Walk in Her Shoes* is an interactive art exhibit that relates the stories of survivors of human trafficking. Each of the shoes displayed represents a woman who has survived sexual exploitation, addiction or life on the streets. Headphones and QR code are affixed to each podium so that visitors can easily listen to the stories by downloading a QR Code Reader and scanning the code.

A Walk in Her Shoes was created by Cherished High Desert, a nonprofit organization, comprised of a residential program and social enterprise that is run by and for survivors of commercialized sexual exploitation, human trafficking, addictions and life on the streets. The stories can also be listened to by visiting the Cherished High Desert website.

## <u>January High Tide and Storms – Update</u>

During the early morning hours last week, MOD field crews kept on top of the king tides as the storm systems made their way through the area. Thirty-seven team members operated 32 portable and stationary pumps, hoses, and barricades on the Newport Peninsula and Balboa Island.

To minimize the potential for street and property flooding, tidal valves were monitored and crews were dispatched to pumps where there was excess water. Last week, pumping occurred at the flooded street ends, as well as Balboa Pier parking lot. Thursday morning tide peaked at 8.0', which was 1.1' above the prediction on the tidal chart. There were no reports of public or private property damage.

Last week's rainfall totaled 1.3", which brought the total recorded rainfall at the Corporation Yard to 8.65" for the season. Great job to all involved, including Administrative Staff for handling incoming phone calls.







## <u>December Storms – Update</u>

December storms brought in heavy rains and winds to the area. Large amounts of sand blew into the streets and parking lots. Field Maintenance crews utilized heavy equipment and manual labor to clean up the windblown sand on the boardwalk, at the Newport Pier Plaza, and at street ends. The storms also washed debris onto the beaches, stretching from the river jetty at Summit Street to 15<sup>th</sup> Street. Crews will continue to clean the beaches as needed during the winter season as more storms are predicted to bring debris into our area beaches.





## <u>Sunset Ridge Park – Sports Field Renovations</u>

The Landscape Division, in coordination with Mariposa Landscape and Sports Field Services, recently made repairs and upgrades to the Sunset Ridge Park Sports Field. Sports field renovations are usually done during the winter downtime at several sports fields for safety and beautification purposes.





## **Beach or Park?**

Last month, Mariposa Landscape crewmembers had an ingenious idea – to use their grass clipping vacuum truck to pick up the windblown sand from the lawn at Marina Park. During one of the wind events, sand traveled 75 feet from the Bayfront beach and covered nearly half of the lawn at the Park.

This ingenious idea made it possible to have the scheduled tree lighting ceremony at the Park, thanks to Mike, Jose, and their crew!

## The Harbor Commission Hosts A Ferry Tour

On Saturday, December 10, the Harbor Commission hosted a two-hour public tour of the harbor aboard one of the Balboa Island ferries. Approximately 50 people attended this informative event, which touched upon all of the current programs and projects in the harbor, such as: derelict vessels, vessel pumpout stations, Coast Guard channel marker replacement, private



dredging permits and eelgrass, mooring management, Marine Committee of the Chamber of Commerce, stand-up paddle board safety, alternative anchorage area, Central Avenue public pier, charter fleet vision 2020, Mariner's Mile Redevelopment, harbor speed limits, Lower Castaways, launch ramps in the harbor and the new Cruising Guide.

This is the second time in two years that we have hosted this event and hope to make it a tradition. Many thanks to the Beek family for providing Newport's famous ferry boat!

## **Grand Canal Dredging Project Update**

The City's contractor. Associated Pacific Constructors, recently completed the first phase of dredging the Grand Canal. Approximately 2,100 cubic yards of material was removed from the canal and transported for offshore disposal. The first phase was an area bound by the Park Avenue Bridge and South Bay Front. In order to complete this project the City needed to receive permits from Californian Costal Commission. Santa Regional Water Quality Control Board, and U.S. Army Corp of Engineers.

Over the next few days the mooring lines, buoys and boats will be moving back and the Grand Canal opened for public use.

With the old bridge removed, the work is now focused on constructing the new bridge components...starting with the falsework over the Canal, followed by the delivery and placement of large prefabricated steel girders next week. Once the girders are placed, Meek will begin constructing the new bridge deck on the girders. The confined jobsite will soon be abuzz with other pieces of equipment, materials, and crews, as the new bridge and the pedestrian ramps take shape.

## MacArthur Blvd. Pavement Rehabilitation Update

Construction on the MacArthur Blvd. Pavement Rehabilitation project from Coast Highway to Ford Road/Bonita Canyon Drive started in November 2016. The project limits are from Coast Highway to Ford Road/Bonita Canyon Drive on MacArthur Blvd. and the project is partially funded by a Federal grant which required work during this season.

Due to the recent and much needed rain, the project has been delayed. By the end of next week, the Contractor will finish the concrete improvements which include removing and



reconstructing deteriorated concrete sidewalks, curbs, and curb access ramps within the project limits.

Deep pavement reconstruction operation is scheduled to start on the evening of Monday, January 30 and run through Friday morning, February 3, weather permitting. Night work hours are from 8 p.m. to 6 a.m. This work is located on MacArthur Blvd. at the Ford Road/Bonita



Canyon Drive intersection and requires large paving equipment; therefore, one lane of traffic will remain open at all times in each direction.

The grind and overlay operation is scheduled for early February. Daytime work hours are from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. This work will cover the entire project limits on MacArthur Blvd. from Coast Highway to Ford Road/Bonita Canyon Drive. Due to large paving equipment, one lane of traffic will remain open at all times in each direction.

Please notice the traffic control cones and signs throughout the construction site and please reduce speed. Also, consider using alternate routes such as Jamboree Road, San Miguel Drive, and Newport Coast Drive during construction to avoid delays. Pavement striping and utility adjustments will follow immediately after paving operations.


Assuming construction progresses as scheduled, this project will be substantially complete by the end of March 2017. Public Works would like to thank you in advance for your patience and understanding as we complete this much needed pavement rehabilitation project.

The irony does not stop with the name as the vessel was a US Coast Guard Documented vessel with multiple vessel liens. In response to the bank liens, the City hired a maritime attorney to work with the court to release the liens so the vessel could be removed.

In October 2016, the US Marshalls were brought in to auction "Bad Habit." Three bidders attended the auction with the successful bid being \$15,000.00. The new owner of the vessel was required to remove "Bad Habit", and in December 2016, the boat finally left Newport Harbor.

Thankfully, today, there is one less "Bad Habit" in Newport Beach.

## Irvine Avenue Pavement & Median Rehabilitation Update


Work for the Irvine Avenue Pavement & Median Rehabilitation project continues to progress. Since the last project update, the contractor has completed installation of a new water efficient irrigation system, weed abatement, and concrete improvements for sidewalk, driveway, cross gutter and ADA curb access ramps. The next order of work will be to install all median hardscape improvements, replace deteriorated guard-rail posts along the s-curve and start planting new California drought tolerant plants and shrubs.

Temporary lane closures between 7 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. will be required to complete this work as efficiently and safely as possible. Public Works staff will monitor traffic conditions, phase work, and adjust work hours and lane closures accordingly.

## Lower Santa Ana River Sand Management Project Update

The Lower Santa Ana River Sand Management project continues to screen and pump sand from the river to a nearshore location near 38th Street. Recent strong weather activity and currents caused the sand discharge pipe in the ocean to break free or lodge itself against the nearby jetties; however, project crews quickly secured the pipe. Our Lifeguard staff have been monitoring the operation daily and keeping the public safely away from the pipe and equipment (Thank you Deputy Chief Williams, Rob Battalion Chief Mike Halphide, Captains Mark Herman and George "Skeeter" Leaper, and all other key lifeguard staff).

To date, approximately 100,000 cubic yards of sand has been pumped to the near shore zone of the planned 525,000 cubic yard effort. In addition,



approximately 20,000 cubic yards of sand has been trucked to Huntington Beach and San Clemente to replenish their beaches. The State Parks have also taken a small quantity of sand and placed it just north of the river in front of the Least Tern Preserve.

On January 30, the County and City staff will be closing the sand shoal area at the ocean outlet of the river. Some refer to this as the "unofficial" dog beach area. The County has allowed the area to be accessible to the public during the first portion of the project activity. However, upcoming activity will consist of stock piling sand on the east side of the river (the shoal area) for the City to use for replenishment efforts, and the area will be closed off to people and animals for the remainder of the project. The project is anticipated to end in May 2017. County and City Staff will provide the public with the attached project update sheet ahead of the closure date and there will be signs posted on the beach about the upcoming closure.








## **SCIENCE OF SUSTAINABILITY SYMPOSIUM**

# WESTERN SNOWY PLOVER AND THE UPCOMING BREEDING SEASON

The Western Snowy Plover (WSP), a threatened species under Endangered Species Act and a resident of our own Balboa Peninsula, is about to enter its yearly nesting season (March 1 through September 30). This little 2-ounce bird lives and breeds at the lower tip of Balboa Peninsula, from the Balboa Pier to the Wedge.

In the last few months, groups of these birds have been found on the peninsula in roosts of 5 to 80 individuals. As the birds approach nesting season, their markings

are becoming more distinct with their gray turning more brown and their patches of black filling in on their shoulders and

faces. If the WSP population chooses to nest on the peninsula this year, we can use some protective measures to protect the nests and eggs from predators or incidental trampling. Although still hard to spot without actively searching, they are enchanting to observe if you are able to spot one of these tiny treasures at their dune habitat.

Currently, the Office of Natural Resources is diligently monitoring the presence of the WSPs in an effort to have stronger data on their presence and also to educate the public about the importance of rehabilitating this indicator species and it's habitat to recovery.
