

The Trolley Is Coming! The Trolley Is Coming!

On Saturday, June 17, the Balboa Peninsula Trolley will officially begin service. As part of the Orange County Transportation Authority's Community Based Transit Circulators Program, the free trolley service will run from 7:30 a.m. to 9:30 p.m. on Saturdays and Sundays through Sunday, September 3, as well as the Fourth of July, making 19 stops along the peninsula. Riders may park in the green striped spaces at the lower Hoag Hospital lot (Hoag Drive and West Coast Highway) or may also hop on at any designated stop. With room for bicycles, surfboards and beach gear, the trolley will offer a fun alternative travel method for residents and visitors alike.

Development Record Set

The active development valuation has reached a historical record of \$863 million due to an overlap in large projects. Construction is winding down on the new apartment building, Villas Fashion Island, while building permits were recently issued to construct two residential towers, Uptown Newport, at 4201 Jamboree Road. There are currently 2,300 different projects under construction throughout the City.

Historical Find

An old building inspector's inspection record card was recently found still posted to a wood stud inside of a wall residence. Discovered by the contractor remodeling the home, the original home was built in early 1957. The building inspector's signature is still visible at the bottom of the card (and no, it is not John Burckle).

Seawall Breach Update

Here is a positive update to the seawall breach at 519 36th Street. The contractor built a temporary extension to the existing seawall, out of masonry block (replacing what was removed). The new wall will be sufficient to hold back the king tides that are scheduled to peak June 23. The temporary wall and the existing seawall will be replaced in the near future based on the tide and construction schedule.

Working Structure Fire

On Sunday, June 4 at 3:42 p.m., Newport Beach Fire Department personnel responded to a working structure fire at 3034 E. Coast Highway in Corona del Mar. The two-alarm fire was located within a one-story multi-unit building. The first in units made an aggressive interior attack of the fire combined with vertical ventilation to contain the fire to the unit of origin. Due to the crew's quick actions, surrounding units did not sustain any damage. During the response, a portion of Pacific Coast Highway was temporarily closed. The fire was contained within 15 minutes from the initial 911 call. There were no injuries reported from the fire.





The cause of the fire is currently under investigation by Newport Beach Fire Department Investigators. Costa Mesa Fire Department, Orange County Fire Authority, and the Newport Beach Police Department also assisted with the call.

Public Safety Day

On May 20, in partnership with Newport Beach Police and Newport Beach Lifeguards, we hosted a Public Safety Day. The event took place behind Fire Station 3 and it was a collaborative event to display the public safety agencies operating in Newport Beach. The turnout from the community was good, with many multi-generational families in attendance.



Fire prevention and disaster preparedness booths were set up so that the crowd could engage with our first responders and CERT Volunteers to learn about public safety. Among the many activities, the community was able to tour a fire station. Our firefighters demonstrated a vehicle extraction and even impressed the audience with a mini-combat challenge showing how quickly they can move in an emergency. On display was a new fire truck and an antique fire truck (normally housed at Balboa Island-Station 4), illustrating advancements in fire apparatus. The public had access to view the inner workings of an ambulance and speak with our Paramedics. On exhibit were the vehicles and wave runners used by our Lifeguards to assist visitors at the beach. It was a great opportunity for the attendees to learn about Fire Operations, Emergency Medical Services, and Marine Operations.

Every 15 Minutes

On Wednesday, May 31, the Newport Beach Fire and Police Departments participated in the "Every 15 Minutes" program at Newport Harbor High School. This is the 14th year in a row that both departments have participated. Each year the program alternates between Newport Harbor and Corona del Mar high schools. "Every 15 Minutes" is a two-day program focusing on high school juniors and seniors in Newport Beach that challenges them to think about drinking and personal safety. The title of the program comes from the fact that every 15 minutes, someone in the United States dies in an alcohol-related traffic collision.





Newport Beach Fire and Police departments worked with the Newport-Mesa school district to set up a realistic scenario to show students prior to their prom and grad-night activities. Knott's Berry Farm make-up artists volunteered their time to create realistic injuries on a simulated fatal drunk driving accident. The program has been extremely successful in underscoring the dangers and consequences of drinking alcohol and driving.

On Wednesday, June 7, the fire department held another mandatory re-certification class for volunteers in our Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) program at fire station 7. Thus far, the fire department has held six mandatory training recertification classes; 285 CERT volunteers have participated in the classes.

Teamwork Saves a Life

On March 14, our fire personnel responded to the scene of a medical aid. Crews from NE63 arrived with Captain Lazar, Engineers Matt Anderson and Jason Fernandez, Paramedics Megan Smith, Aaron Reed, and Matt Johnston, and found the patient sitting on the ground in the parking garage. The patient felt dizzy, complained of chest pain, and was nauseated. Our paramedics transported the patient to the hospital where he received an emergency heart procedure to treat his life-threatening heart attack. Due to the efforts of all



involved, the patient made a full recovery. The patient was so grateful for the care given by our crew that he invited them to his "celebration of life" event to show his appreciation.



TRAINING

- We are moving forward with our Peer Support program with lifeguards, fire, and police personnel, as well as a countywide program. Advanced training will be provided this month.
- Our paramedics completed training on a new medication for diabetics (D-10) and a medication to treat shock states. These are the same medications used in Emergency Rooms and Intensive Care Units.

Drone

Newport Beach lifeguards recently purchased a drone for observations of marine animals, such as sharks. The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) has certified Lifeguard Captains George Leeper and Adam Yacenda as drone operators.



Boat Runs Aground

On Monday June 5, at approximately 6:15 a.m., Newport Beach Fire Department Marine Operations responded to a boat on the beach at 12th Street. The 24-foot sport fishing boat had ran aground the previous night. The boat was in danger of breaking apart in the surf line with a 3-5 foot south swell and high tide.





Lifeguard Captain John Moore boarded the boat to investigate. The boat was leaking diesel fuel into the ocean and it was determined that an environmental hazard existed. The City of Newport Beach Municipal Operations personnel assisted by pulling the boat onto the beach with a Skiploader. The boat was secured and turned over to Towboat US for salvage.

Orange County Drowning Prevention Task Force

On June 1, Newport Beach lifeguards hosted the Orange County Drowning Prevention Task Force with a media event. The event was to help promote water safety and drowning prevention for the upcoming summer season. Orange County Supervisor Todd Spitzer, Council Member Diane Dixon, Julie Lopiccolo, Kaleigh Gilchrist (2016 Olympian and Gold Medalist), and several other members from surrounding cities attended.

With smartphones now in 80 percent of U.S. homes we are now living in a mobile digital age. As we spend more time living in a mobile environment, it is good to take a bit of time to think about how to stay secure in this new environment. Here are a few Mobile security tips to help make sure you are safe.

Mobile Security Simple Tips

- Use strong passwords. Change any default passwords on your mobile device to ones that would be difficult for someone to guess. Use different passwords for different programs and devices. Do not choose options that allow your device to remember your passwords.
- 2. Keep software up to date. Install updates for apps and your device's operating system as soon as they are available. Keeping the software on your mobile device up to date will prevent attackers from being able to take advantage of known vulnerabilities.
- 3. Disable remote connectivity. Some mobile devices are equipped with wireless technologies, such as Bluetooth, that can connect to other devices. Disable these features when they are not in use.
- 4. Be careful what you post and when. Wait to post pictures from trips and events so that people do not know where to find you. Posting where you are also reminds others that your house is empty.
- 5. Guard your mobile device. In order to prevent theft and unauthorized access, never leave your mobile device unattended in a public place and lock your device when it is not in use.
- 6. Know your apps. Be sure to review and understand the details of an app before downloading and installing it. Be aware that apps may request access to your location and personal information. Delete any apps that you do not use regularly to increase your security.
- 7. Know the available resources. Use the Federal Communications Commission's Smartphone Security Checker at www.fcc.gov/smartphone-security

John Wayne Park Dedication Preparation

In preparation for the dedication ceremony at John Wayne Park, the Landscape Division coordinated a new park sign. In addition to the sign, the trees were trimmed, the lawn was fertilized, sprinkler heads were replaced, a new flagpole was installed, and new decomposed granite was placed around the Special Coral tree.

The Concrete Crew poured a new concrete walkway and fixed the base around the new flagpole, and the existing plaques were refurbished.





Newport Aquatic Center Entrance Improvements



City staff had received complaints from local residents of loud, disruptive noise coming from vehicles entering the Newport Aquatic Center (NAC) after hours. The dirt and parking areas are being utilized without permission for car racing and as a place for loitering activities, leaving a lot of trash on the ground. In order to stop the flow of traffic into the NAC after

closing, the Public Works and Municipal Operations Departments worked together to install spike strips and signage. The exit gate remains open to allow vehicles to leave the premises, while preventing vehicles from entering once the center is closed.

Fishing Out a Boat

This week, MOD Field crew members assisted with a 30-foot boat that had washed ashore at the beach on 13th Street. Caught up in the surf, the boat crew had to abandon ship. Field Maintenance crew utilized heavy equipment to drag the boat out of the water and a private company hauled the boat out of the beach.





Finley Tract Flooding

On Wednesday May 24 at 8 p.m. crews responded to calls about flooding at 36th and Short Street in the Finley Tract. When crews arrived, police and fire units were already on scene and had blocked several flooded streets where some areas were two feet deep in water.

A contractor that recently demolished a home had removed a concrete planter that was also serving as an extension of the seawall. City crews immediately placed sand bags to minimize flooding and began pumping the water back into the bay. Fire crews went door to door checking on residents and offering sandbags. In combination with

pumping and the tide level declining, the water subsided within a short time. Approximately 12 garages were flooded, as well as one home and a couple of cars.

On Thursday May 25, City crews worked with the property owner's contractor to build a temporary sandbag wall as the tides were expected to be even higher than the night before. By 9:30 p.m. it was noticed that the temporary sandbag wall was not holding. With the assistance of the community residents, crews again moved sandbags and began pumping. Efforts were successful and no further homes were affected.

A big thank you goes to our Police, Fire, community members and the Municipal Operations crews for responding so quickly and reducing property damage. We would also like to thank Seimone Jurjis and his staff of the Community Development Department for working with the property owner and contractors to install a better temporary seawall, which held during the third high tide on May 26. Plans are in the works for a permanent seawall in the coming months.

An attendee at the event commented that they were "...proud to see such fine quality members of both departments." I agree with this sentiment, and I would like to say thank you to the Police and Fire Department members who organized and worked during this event.



FIELD OF HONOR



On Saturday, May 20, Lieutenants Cartwright and Fischbacher attended the 8th Annual Field of Honor ceremony hosted by the Exchange Club of Newport Harbor. Officers Farris and Olivas also represented the Police Department as members of our Honor Guard. This event recognizes military service members by flying 1,776 flags in Castaways Park from Armed Forces Day through Memorial Day.

PREVENTION THROUGH EDUCATION

On May 24, the Newport Beach Police Department hosted a Licensee Education on Alcohol Drugs (LEADs) and training seminar. put on by the Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control. Forty-seven servers, bartenders and managers attended the class, most from local bars and restaurants. The 4hour seminar was taught by a retired ABC Supervising Agent, and it provided attendees with



practical information on serving alcoholic beverages safely, responsibly and legally as well as preventing illicit drug activity at licensed establishments.

At the conclusion of the class, attendees were required to pass an exam on the material that was covered. Each person who fulfilled all of the training requirements received a certificate, via email, certifying they successfully completed a LEADs training seminar.

The Newport Beach Police Department expects and encourages establishments to act responsibly relative to their alcoholic beverage license privileges. Our goal is to provide them with the tools and support where appropriate.

We will be hosting another class on June 12 in order to prepare our alcohol establishments for summer. I would like to thank Civilian Investigator Wendy Joe for coordinating this important training seminar for our community.

EVERY 15 MINUTES AT NEWPORT HARBOR HIGH SCHOOL

On Wednesday and Thursday, May 31 and June 1, the juniors and seniors at Newport Harbor High School participated in the "Every 15 Minutes" program. This program is designed to show high school students the dangers of drinking and driving.

On the first day (Wednesday), an NBPD volunteer in the guise of the "Grim Reaper" roams from classroom to classroom, collecting students who have been pre-selected to participate in the event. As each teen is excused from class, a uniformed Police Officer reads an "obituary" to his or her classmates. These students represent the statistic that gave the program its name: every 15 minutes, someone in the United States dies as a result of an alcohol-related traffic collision. These students are then given an unsettling makeover: their faces are painted with black-and-white makeup, signifying that they are the "living dead" who represent the nation-wide average of more than 20 DUI-related deaths that will occur over the course of the rest of the school day. A special effects artist from Knott's Scary Farm also spent the morning creating realistic wounds and injuries on four other students, who will play a significant role in the next segment of the program.





Later that morning, the juniors and seniors hear the 9-1-1 call from the accident over the loud speaker. As they file out of their classes and take their seats in the bleachers, they are faced with a tragic scene. Four of their classmates are in damaged vehicles or on the asphalt nearby—victims of what appears to be a terrible traffic collision (as staged by the Police and Fire Departments). Emergency personnel respond to the scene and attempt to render aid. Medics transport two of the teens to Hoag Hospital with life-threatening injuries and, with heavy hearts, declare that both of the students have "died." The fourth and only surviving student is "arrested" for Driving Under the Influence as staff from Pacific View Mortuary take the "deceased" student away in a hearse, followed by a somber train of the "living dead". With this striking image fresh in their minds, the juniors and seniors return to their regular schedule for the rest of the day.

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The 19 participants (18 students and one teacher), however, are not done. They participate in a number of activities under the supervision of Police Department staff and a teacher from Newport Harbor High School. After tours and talks at Pacific View Mortuary and Harbor Justice Center, the students are lodged at the Ayres Hotel in Costa Mesa overnight. There, guest speakers share personal stories of loss and tragedy from DUI-related accidents. Supported by their chaperones, the students begin to share their own experiences and feelings with the group. Before they go to bed for the night, each student writes a letter to his or her parents that begins with the words, "Dear Mom and Dad, today I died and I never had a chance to say..."

On Thursday morning, all of the junior and senior students file past a casket on their way to an assembly in the Auditorium. They are shown a video of the previous day's activities, including simulations of the Emergency Room scene at Hoag, the booking process at the NBPD Jail, the bail hearing at Harbor Justice Center and the death notifications to the parents of the students involved in the accident. Two of the "living dead" share the letters that they wrote the night before, and the family of the "accident victims" share similar letters. A Guest Speaker from Mothers Against Drunk Driving then addresses the students, sharing personal testimony about the pain of losing her best friend to an alcohol-related fatal collision when she was in high school.

This dramatic and moving two-day event is the result of months of planning by our designated School Resource Officers, who put on an Every 15 Minutes event each year, alternating between Newport Harbor and Corona del Mar High Schools. Funding for the Every 15 Minutes Program was made possible by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety, through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration and by the generous support of local businesses and community members.

SPECIAL OLYMPICS TORCH RUN... AND TIP-A-COP EVENT



On Thursday, June 1, more than twenty sworn and civilian Police Department runners participated in the 2017 Special Olympics Law Enforcement Torch Run. We received the torch from California Highway Patrol at Pacific Coast Highway and Jamboree, and continued the relay to Mariners Park, where we passed the torch off to representatives of the Costa Mesa Police Department. This event serves as a fundraiser and provides awareness to the Special Olympics of Southern California. Our department is honored to participate in this worthy cause.


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In a week, we are also participating in another event to support the Special Olympics:

Lido Village & West Newport Water Main Replacement

Construction for the Lido Village and West Newport Water Main Replacement project is finally underway. The contractor (Paulus Engineering, Inc.) began work on May 8 and has already completed water main improvements related to the Lido House Hotel development located on 32nd Street.

Currently, the contractor is busy installing valves along Balboa Boulevard in preparation for water main replacement work in the West Newport community.

The first order of work in this community will be to replace the old cast iron water main located in the alley between 44th and 43rd Street, and Balboa Boulevard and River Avenue. This work will begin June 8 and should be completed by June 30. After the July 4 holiday, the contractor will begin water main replacement in the next alley located between 43rd and 42nd Street.

Headwaters To Oceans Conference (H20)

Fire Station #3 Roof Replacement Project



Fire Station #3 located next to to Police Headquaters along Jamboree Road is receiving a new roof. The roof has not been replaced since the building was constructed in 1973. A similar roofing system will replace the aging product which will improve drainage and provide several improvements to the building. Although the roof was maintained very well it was showing its age and needed to be replaced.

Currently, the contractor is placing flashing and sealing the HVAC units; next week a few touchup

items. The last steps include spraying a roof sealant followed by placing gravel over the entire roof surface. Once replaced, the roof on Fire Station #3 will be good for the next three decades.

Bonita Canyon Sport Park Pickleball Courts

Pickleball?...Yes, after planning and design, pickleball is coming to Newport Beach, specifically Bonita Canyon Sports Park.

Newport Terrace Storm Drain

Many folks may not know about Newport Terrace, a Newport Beach community located north of 19th Street close to the Santa Ana River. It is situated just downstream of Canyon Park, a local jewel located within the City of Costa Mesa.

A large storm drain under the Newport Terrace community conveys storm runoff that flows from Canyon Park. The Newport Terrace Community Association has made improvements to the storm drain inlet that falls just outside City of Newport Beach city limits and within City of Costa Mesa Right-of-Way. Based on successful completion of those improvements, the City of Newport Beach's



Municipal Operations Department will take over responsibility for keeping the inlet free of accumulated debris. Engineers and maintenance staff from both cities will continue to meet annually before the rain season to confirm the stream in Canyon Park is free of large debris that could potentially block the storm drain inlet.




OASIS FITNESS CENTER GETS MODERNIZED

YOUTH PROGRAMS AT A GLANCE

Knowledge is key, so learn about some of the many youth programs run by the Department for the community.

Mayor's Youth Council (MYC)

A dedicated group of teens (52) who strive to improve the Newport Beach community through participation in local government and charitable works. The MYC primarily focuses on:

- 1. Government Experience
 - Participation in their own council debating on topics & voting issues.
 - Attending several City Council meetings and community meetings.
- 2. Community Service
 - MYC's goal this year is to volunteer over 500 hours.
- 3. Youth & Government Day
 - 21 teens participated in a one day in-service, with staff and council.

Active Kids

The most popular after school program within the city is Active Kids. This subsidized program is available at three different locations; Mariners VJC Room, Newport Elementary, and the Community Youth Center (CYC).

- 1. Impact
 - In the 2016-2017 school year, over 2,745 hours of affordable care were provided.
 - The programs serves up to 165 participants daily.
- 2. Kids for Peace
 - A curriculum introduced in Fall 2016 with the mission to empower our kids to be leaders in our community through acts of kindness.
 - CYC Active Kids collected and donated 105 pairs of socks to the Salvation Army.

Preschool 101

Preschool 101 is a fun and safe environment for participants to learn and socialize. This program is an introduction to toddlers to a classroom environment and follows the curriculum guidelines to prepare for kindergarten.

- 1. Impact
 - In the 2016-2017 school year, over 957 hours of childcare for pre-school age children.

Summer Programs on the horizon...

Ten weeks of staff-run full day camps are provided at two different locations for kids ages 6-12 yrs. Eight weeks of half day morning camps are provided for kids ages 3-5 yrs.

- 1. Impact
 - Out of 1,300 spots, 92% are already filled.
 - The Department will provide over 1,190 hours of quality childcare for ages 3-12 yrs.



OASIS HOSTS BACKHAUSDANCE WORKSHOP

Over 20 people participated in the one day, Backhausdance workshop on May 22 at OASIS. The contemporary dance company offered a 75 minute dance and movement class. Participants were introduced to the combined elements of modern ballet and creative movement dance.

OCTA PRESENTATION



This training was informative and will help ensure seniors are safe while riding in our City vehicles.





MUCH ADO ABOUT FENCING

A few city parks and athletic fields had repairs and improvements completed on their fencing this spring.

Peninsula Park

The Municipal Operations Department's Parks Division in conjunction with the Recreation and Senior Services Department improved the fence and sod around the perimeter of Peninsula Park. We replaced over 400 feet of fencing with a powder-coated material to better withstand our marine environment and help to avoid rust.
