TEAMWORK BY NEWPORT BEACH FIRE & POLICE DEPARTMENT

On August 26, Newport Beach Police Department (NBPD) responded to an emergency call of a person screaming. Newport Beach Fire Department (NBFD) crews from NM62, paramedics Callinan, Carter and NE62, Captain White, Engineer Reideler, and Firefighter Terzo arrived to the medical call. Upon NBPD personnel's arrival, Officers Cox and Hume found the patient face down on the floor and appeared to be

suffering from an opioid overdose. The patient had shallow breathing and on several occasions stopped breathing. At that time, Officer Cox administered two doses of Narcan to the patient. The doses restored the patient's breathing. NBFD arrived and assumed Advanced Life Support measures. The patient was transported to the hospital and made a full recovery. The NBPD has been approved by OC-EMS to administer Narcan (4mg0.1 ml) Nasal Spray to suspect opioid overdoses prior to arrival of Fire personnel. Just four hours prior to this incident, Officer Cox completed his training of administering Narcan.

On September 3, NBFD crews from NM62, Paramedic Janis, Anderson, NE62, Captain Dall, Engineer Keene, Firefighter Radas, NT62, Captain Sutherland, Engineer Hopper, Paramedic Laser and Tillerperson Terzo responded to a full arrest, a patient who was not breathing and did not have a heartbeat. Upon their arrival, NBPD officers were on scene performing CPR on the patient who had drowned. Fire crews provided Advanced Life Support on scene as well as during transport to the hospital. Due to the actions of all crews involved and NBPD, the patient made a full recovery and discharged home from the hospital.

Library Services

International Literacy Day

Our Literacy Services program welcomed guests to International Literacy Day last Thursday to honor the learners, tutors, and supporters of the program. Newport Beach City Councilman Will O' Neill read a City proclamation designating September 14, 2017 as Literacy Awareness Day in Newport Beach. Adult learner Carmen Caicedo shared the story of her home country, Venezuela, clearly illustrating the struggles the country faces today. Orange County Supervisor, Michelle Steel, presented a special award honoring the Library's



Support Services Coordinator, Melissa Kelly, for her many years of work and dedication to Literacy Services. Michelle Steel also recognized and awarded two learners, Keyhan Zaker and Maria Alvarez, who became citizens this past year. In addition to Supervisor Michelle Steel, District Representative Tim Whitacre, City Councilmen Will O' Neil and Jeff Herdman, presented award-winner Negar Pourasad with certificates recognizing her achievements, goals and many accomplishments since joining the program. The inspiring program emphasized the importance of literacy skills in our society as well as the valuable link between literacy and libraries.

Digital Saturday

The Library had a very successful Digital Saturday last weekend with over 200 customers participating. We had hourly presentations on various digital resources in our Media Lab with all seats filled. Staff fielded questions from customers on eBooks, databases and our Tech Toys, at a lobby table and display. It was a good opportunity to acquaint customers with all of our digital resources, and many regular library users expressed surprise at just how much was available of which they had not previously been aware. There was a lot of interest in the upcoming genealogy classes and Tuesday tech classes. The NBPL Foundation also had a table in the Popular Library.

Cliff Drive Park "Scout House"

Activities included grubbing out all the Pepper tree suckers, trimming the Ficus trees as well as the Pittosporum flowering plants, and removing dead ice plant from the slope.

The slope was filled in with Aloe camperi, Carissa, Pennisetum rubrum, and Bougainvillea.



Bench Donation

The Park Maintenance Crew recently installed dedicatory benches at Mariners Park. The benches are in memory of Mary Linn Baker, and Andy and Dorothy Thomas, donated by Don Williams.



Storm Season Preparations Have Begun

In preparation for the winter season, last week the Storm Drain Crew completed the annual installation of the 2,750-gallon-per-minute de-watering pump, and 6" PVC hard line piping at the low-lying area of 30th Street and Lafayette Avenue in Cannery Village. The pump will minimize street and private property flooding if high tide and rain events occur simultaneously.

This week, the Storm Drain Crew finished the removal of 435 inlet guards in front of catch basins on Balboa Boulevard, Balboa Island, and portions of Coast Highway in West Newport and Corona Del Mar to minimize the potential for flooding during the upcoming winter/rainy season. The program was implemented 15 years ago, and the inlet guards have proven to be one of the best structural improvements that the City has made in order to improve water quality and to keep trash and other debris from entering into our harbor and ocean during the dry spring and summer months.





Yard Fence Screen at the Corporation Yard Replaced

The fence screen at the Corporation Yard was recently replaced. The screen fencing was over 15 years old, was weathered and had reached its service life. The City contractor removed and replaced 400 linear feet of screen on the north and east sides of the Yard.





Relocation of the Reagan Statue

Last week, MOD staff assisted in the relocation of the Reagan Statue from Bonita Canyon Sports Park to the Civic Center Park. Field Maintenance Crew worked alongside Display Art, Inc. to saw cut the statue at the base from its existing footing.

The statue was then a passenger on a forklift and trucked to its new location near the elevator, where the Field Maintenance Crew had poured a one-ton concrete pad to secure the statue.



Green on the Green Expo

Municipal Operations and Public Works Departments held a booth at the Green on the Green Expo on Saturday, September 9th at the Civic Center. We talked about water conservation, how urban water runoff affects the bay and ocean water quality, and the City's street light LED replacement program. CONGRATULATIONS TO SERGEANT DEPWEG

Sergeant Court Depweg has had a busy week.

Last Friday, September 15, the United States Attorney's Office honored him, alongside retired Detective Dave Syvock, at their 16th Annual Law Enforcement Awards. Sergeant Depweg received the award for his work as a Detective assigned to the Orange County Regional Narcotics Suppression Program.

Sergeant Depweg conducted a seven-year investigation, which revealed that the company, Western Union, was aiding and abetting criminal organizations in laundering over 52 million dollars from the United States to the People's Republic of China from 2005 to 2010. The criminal proceeds being laundered through over 50 Western Union remitter locations were the result of profits from human trafficking, prostitution, drug trafficking, sales of illegal firearms, intellectual property rights violations, fraud and illegal gambling.

Western Union agreed to enter into a Deferred Prosecution with the Department of Justice and the Federal Trade Commission. They were required to make substantial regulatory changes and forfeit 586 million dollars. The forfeiture for this case is the largest in Orange County history by local law enforcement, and the largest forfeiture by a money remitter.

Sergeant Depweg also graduated from Sherman Supervisory the Block Leadership Institute (SLI) on Wednesday, September 20. SLI is a program designed to stimulate personal growth, leadership and ethical decision-making in California law enforcement front-line supervisors. Designed and implemented in 1988 through the efforts of California law enforcement professionals, along with top educators and trainers, SLI is an intense program based on experiential learning techniques.



Marina Park Receives APWA Nationwide "Project of the Year" Award



Big Canyon Reservoir Metering Vault and Treatment Improvements to Begin Construction

Public Works recently awarded a construction contract for the Big Canyon Reservoir Metering Vault and Treatment Improvements project to Schuler Constructors. This project includes construction of a new metering vault, installation of a magnetic flow meter, installation of hydraulic and static mixing systems and replacement of the in-building crane located at the Big Canyon Reservoir.

The Contractor will soon begin ordering system components that have long lead times; therefore, construction is anticipated to begin in October.



We are excited that this project is coming to fruition and are very thankful for the participation and coordination with the Water Production team, who was involved in the entire design process.

The opening will be short-lived, as phase 2 of the project is scheduled to begin in October with the Central Avenue Plaza Revitilization.




Public Works' Harbor Operations – Coordination With Code Enforcement


WHAT: OCPW contractors will perform improvements on the deteriorated pavement along the Bayview Trail. This will include sealing cracks, grinding and paving over 3,700 square yards of asphalt pavement, applying a protective coat ("slurry seal") to an area of more than 18,000 square yards, striping and stenciling.

NOTE: This multi-purpose trail will be completely closed during the two-week construction period listed below to accommodate these improvements. There will be trail closure signs posted and all pedestrians and bicyclists are advised to prepare for using alternate routes. Traffic control safety measures will be in place to ensure the safety of the public and project crews.



After each week of camp, staff collected surveys from the parents with feedback on their child's camp experience. We received 291 responses with predominately positive feedback. Here are some highlights!


