#### **CERT Program Awarded with a Pacific Life Foundation Grant**

For the third consecutive year, the Newport Beach Fire Department CERT program was awarded with a \$7,500 grant from the Pacific Life Foundation. The Pacific Life Foundation has supported the Fire Department's CERT program since its inception in 1999. The grant funds will be utilized for a variety of CERT program needs, including CPR equipment.

#### **Spring 2018 CERT Programs**

The fire department started its spring 2018 CERT programs. This spring, the fire department held a Thursday day program that started on Thursday, February 8 and will hold an all-day Saturday CERT program that starts on March 3. Both the Thursday day and all-day Saturday programs are full as we have a maximum number of participants in both. The fire department will release the fall 2018 CERT program schedule in the next few weeks.

#### St. Marks Presbyterian Church Disaster Preparedness Presentation

On February 11, a Life Safety Specialist presented to the St. Marks Presbyterian Church congregation following their Sunday service. The presentation covered the different types of disasters that might affect Newport Beach, how the fire department responds to emergencies, and what residents can do to be better prepared.

#### **EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES (EMS) DIVISION**

#### **Patient Visits Fire Station 2**

On January 19, the fire department responded to a traffic collision. NBFD crews from Medic 63: Paramedics J. Martin and Rush; Engine 66: Captain Hutzler, Firefighter Ruffini, Paramedic Kang; Engine 67: Captain Winokur, Engineer Dean, Paramedic Anderson; and Truck 62: Captain Sutherland, Engineer Hopper and Tiller Ellis arrived to the scene. Upon arrival, they found the patient in full cardiac arrest. Crews from Truck 62 initiated CPR. While on scene, the patient regained a pulse. On the way to the hospital, the patient began to breathe without medical support. Due to the actions of all crews involved, the patient made a full recovery and was discharged home from the hospital. Crews from Engine 66 and Medic 63 provided Advanced Life Support measures.

On February 9, the patient's spouse came into City Hall to express gratitude to the fire department for saving the patient's life, and dropped off a thank you letter. The patient and patient's family visited Fire Station 2 and met the crews that were instrumental in saving the patient's life.





#### Significant Other Survival "SOS" Workshop

On February 10, EMS Division Chief Kristin Thompson, in partnership with Counseling Team International, hosted our second "Significant Other Survival" (SOS) workshop. The four-hour workshop focused on "fire family" wellness and how the challenges of the firefighter occupation can bring unique stressors to their personal relationships. They learned how stressors such as 48+hour shifts, sleep deprivation, missing significant family events, effects from traumatic and emotional calls, death and near death experiences in those they rescue and their fellow firefighters as well as themselves can affect home life.




The workshop teaches ways to assist their firefighter with work-related challenges, communication and how to improve resiliency as well as develop positive coping mechanisms for themselves.



#### Pier Rescue

On February 11, at approximately 6 a.m., anglers on the Newport Pier called 911 to report a swimmer in distress. Newport Beach Police Officers arrived on scene in time to deploy a life ring tethered to the pier.

Newport Beach Firefighters and Night Stand-by Lifeguards responded to the scene. Lifeguard Captain George Leeper jumped off the end of the pier to make the rescue.

The victim was brought safely to shore. Newport Beach Fire personnel treated and transported the patient.

The sea conditions and cold-water temperature make it dangerous to enter the ocean at night without proper training and equipment. Hypothermia can quickly set in when exposed to cold water.

Reminder: it is illegal to jump off the pier. It is extremely dangerous to swim at night. Always swim near a lifeguard and never swim alone.

#### **Junior Lifeguard Swim Tests**



March 4 kicks off the first of three 2018 Newport Beach Junior Lifeguard swim tests! This is an exciting day for kids to have their first chance at qualifying for the highly anticipated 2018 NBJG Program. The test takes place from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Corona del Mar High School pool. The additional swim test dates are March 10 and March 18. Each swim test can have anywhere from 300 to 500 children trying out!

#### **Dolphins**

## **Recruitment and Selection Tips**

- Prepare by having a friend or family member ask you questions or try to answer questions while looking in a mirror.
- Give yourself plenty of time to get to the interview, taking traffic and other delays into account so you can arrive about 10 minutes early.
- Be polite to everyone you meet.
- Know your résumé so you will not have to refer to it during the interview.
- Make a list of at least five accomplishments to have in mind.
- Research the company and know the names of the people you are interviewing with.
- Bring a few extra copies of your résumé in case the interviewer needs one.
- Bring along a pen and paper to take notes. After the interview, write down your impressions while they are fresh.
- Stay calm and be confident!

Attendees participated in skills-based exercises including counseling meetings, preparation of personnel documentation and providing performance feedback. # Be Approachable. It invites Opportunity.



Whether you are an entry-level employee or a high-level manager, being approachable in the workplace can help you gain recognition and respect. Staff recently installed Titan HST safety and security software on library staff computers and devices in order to use them as alert devices in the event of an emergency.


#### **Lucky Day Collection**

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#### SCAM ALERT: BLACKMAIL SCAMS

We have received several calls about a new nationwide scam lately... here are the details on how these blackmail scams work:

You get a letter in the mail from an unknown person. When you read it, you find that the sender is demanding money (thousands of dollars). Why? Because the sender "knows something about you."



#### Here's what you can do:

- **1. Stop. Don't send money.** Never wire money on a prepaid debit card or send cash to an unknown person. You won't get it back.
- **2. Pass this information on to a friend.** You might know that these letters are fakes, but chances are that you know someone who doesn't.

### POLICE APPRECIATION BREAKFAST PREPARATIONS





# **More Grant Funding Heading to the Harbor**

Last week, California Department of Fish and Wildlife informed the City that it was being awarded a grant from the Spill Prevention & Response Equipment program. This program offers funding to allow local agencies to better respond to oil/fuel spills near the State's natural resources. The \$35,000 grant will be used to purchase spill prevention, response equipment and clean-up materials to be deployed in the event of a spill in the harbor.

This funding opportunity was identified and pursued by Management Assistant Raymund Reyes after problemsolving the issue with Harbormaster Dennis Durgan and



his staff. This collaboration led to a completed application and follow-up visit from State officials before the formal announcement. Staff plans to bring this item before City Council in March for formal acceptance of the grant funding. Better works by working together!


