Preparation for Orange County Projections 2018

This week staff met with the Center of Demographic Research (CDR) and the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG) to discuss the up and coming Orange County Projections 2018 (OCP 2018). OCP is a dataset containing population, housing and employment forecasting information derived from local input from each Orange County jurisdiction. The data is used by multiple agencies for local and regional planning, which include such efforts as forecasting traffic demand, sewer and water demand, congestion management plans and State's Regional Housing Needs Assessment (RHNA). The purpose of the meeting was for CDR and SCAG to provide an overview of the OCP process and answer staff's questions regarding the review of the data.

Staff Attends Annual California Building Officials Meeting

Building Division staff attended the California Building Officials Annual Business Meeting (ABM).

Approximately 300 attendees from various jurisdictions represented the regulatory bodies enforcing the building codes.

Situations that impact building department staffing levels, operations, and resource allocations in the aftermath of natural disasters, such as the fires in Northern California and the mudslides in Santa Barbara County, were discussed. Other topics focused on improving customer service by implementing technological tools such as electronic plan check, queuing systems, improving turnaround times, and online plan submittal for review.

Basketball Hoops in Residential Streets Lead to Serious Issues

There has been a recent increase of residents leaving portable basketball hoops on city streets. The street sweepers must avoid the basketball hoop which causes areas to be missed leaving dirt,

trash, dried oil, leaves, and standing water behind. It creates both environmental and health risks. With just a small amount of water, the debris and oil can make its way into the storm drain system, which flows directly into the bay and produces serious water quality issues. If water sits in the gutters, it becomes stagnant and a perfect breeding ground for mosquitoes. In March, the Code Enforcement Team started to inform residents about the issues created by leaving the hoops on the street. We have successfully removed over 30 basketball hoops from the streets and created a clear path for the street sweepers.

FIRE OPERATIONS DIVISION

Special Olympics Torch Walk and Event

On April 5, the fire department sponsored two teams in the Special Olympics Torch Walk and basketball hoops challenge held at the Newport Beach Civic Center.

Multiple Agencies assist Federal Investigators

The fire department responded to a homemade drug lab on the peninsula after federal investigators serving a search warrant located the area. A hazardous materials team responded to assist with the decontamination of personnel recovering evidence. Authorities suspected the presence of Fentanyl, which had allegedly been made at the location. The department operated in unified command with multiple agencies in the county.

Newport Beach Fire visits Los Angeles County Fire Station 51 at Universal Studios

Fire Chief Duncan, Assistant Chief Boyles, and Training Captain Tiscareno, visited Los Angeles County Fire Station 51 to learn about the Early Warning Network System created by Warning Labs. The system works in conjunction with the Federal Early Earthquake Warning System, which detects earthquakes before they happen. A signal is sent to the hardware attached to the station announcement system and automatically opens up apparatus doors to move engines, trucks, and medic vans out of collapse zones. Currently, Station 51 is the only fire station utilizing this technology. The fire department is planning to make a presentation at a future City Council Meeting.









TRAINING

Members of the fire investigators from the fire department attended a training class facilitated by the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives taught by Brian Grove, Fire Protection Engineer. The class included fire patterns, fire dynamics, and a two-hour live fire demonstration. The National Fire Protection Association requires fire investigators to participate in continuous education.



COMMUNITY EMERGENCY RESPONSE TEAM

CERT "All Hands" Meeting/Tsunami Awareness Workshop

On March 22, the fire department hosted the first CERT quarterly "All Hands" meeting of 2018. The meeting was held as a Tsunami Awareness Workshop and had presenters from the State of California as well as the city's Emergency Services Coordinator Katie Eing. The workshop covered how tsunamis are generated, the tsunami threat to Newport Beach and what the city is doing to prepare for this unexpected event. All CERT quarterly "All Hands" meetings are open to the public and take place at the Newport Beach Central Library Friends Room. Future quarterly meetings for 2018 will take place on June 6, September 5, and November 13.

Spring 2018 Community Emergency Response Team programs

On March 24, the fire department held its bi-annual CERT "Drill the Skills" at fire station #7. The CERT "Drill the Skills" is held twice each year and is the culmination of both fall and spring CERT programs. The fire department offers four CERT programs a year- two in the fall and two in the spring. This spring 55 participants officially graduated having completed the full 24-hour certification program. EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES (EMS) DIVISION

Exceptional Save Rates

The EMS Division has completed a one-year study of all our cardiac arrest patients (patients not breathing and no heartbeat) in 2017. We looked at the following criteria: Advanced Life Support care given by our firefighters; if they had CPR prior to arrival of the fire department; and if we were able to restart their heart prior to arrival at the hospital. Of our patients without a heartbeat, an astounding **62%** of them had their hearts restarted by fire personnel! National averages hover around 30% and our Orange County aggregate rate is 17% for return of a heartbeat for patients in cardiac arrest. We credit this



incredibly high rate in part to training, teamwork of the firefighters (and oftentimes lifeguards), the Advanced Life Saving equipment, medications we carry, and our response times. This study will continue in 2018 and in the future and will incorporate more advanced parameters.

New Fire Rehabilitation Unit

Operating on fire incidents, some lasting hours and hours, is a physically demanding job for firefighters and can be environmentally challenging as well. For that reason, the fire department has a fire rehab unit. What is a fire rehab unit? It is a vehicle or trailer that is brought to the scene of fire incidents or extended incidents. Fire personnel can seek shelter from the weather, rest, recover, rehydrate, refuel and receive medical monitoring. The fire department is replacing our 10+ year old rehab trailer for a new unit to better fit the unique needs of our department. Captain Chris Brown and Chief Thompson have been working diligently on designing the new unit to meet our needs and the National Fire Protection Agency Standard 1584 – Fire Incident Rehabilitation. The new fire rehab unit will take approximately six months to build and should be here by fall.



MARINE OPERATIONS DIVISION

With spring break, our beaches and city continue to be very popular for visitors. On Easter Sunday, we had a beach population of approximately 45,000 visitors.

The 47th Annual Police Appreciation Breakfast was held on March 29, 2018 at the Hyatt Regency, Newport Beach. The event was hosted by the Newport Beach Chamber of Commerce and the Commodores Club, and sponsored by the Maseeh Family, Hoag Memorial Hospital Presbyterian and Newport Beach & Company. Members of the Police Department were honored at the breakfast, which was also attended by city staff, community leaders and members of the local business community.

Nominations for the Police Department Annual Awards are collected by committees for each award category. Members of the Police Department who receive award nominations are discussed by those committees, and then recommendations are submitted to the Chief of Police for consideration. Additional awards were received as follows:

Chief's Citation presented to **Margaret "Peg" Peterson** of the Orange County Healthcare Agency

For the last five years, Peg has been assigned to the NBPD in the role of Psychiatric Emergency Response Team clinician. Peg has been instrumental in the Department's work with the homeless population, offering her extensive experience in the mental health field and her ability to build rapport with individuals in crisis. She is recognized for her dedicated service and for being a resource for our staff and our community.

Chief's Citation presented to Reserve Officer Steve Schogel

In 2017, Reserve Officer Schogel began an innovative project, marrying his work as a part-time Reserve Officer with his profession as a Physician Assistant to create the Newport Beach Police Department Naloxone Program. After extensive research and recommendations by Reserve Officer Schogel, Naloxone (a medication used to rapidly reverse opioid overdoses) has been issued to every field officer in the Police Department. Use of the medication has already saved a number of lives here in Newport Beach, with a few examples appearing below as Lifesaving Awards. Steve's expertise in the medical field has also led him to develop an eight-hour First Aid, CPR and automated external defibrillator (AED) training course for the Department, ensuring that our staff has the necessary tools to render aid in critical situations. He is recognized for his diligence and his dedication to these significant projects.

Lifesaving Award presented to Officer Mark Fasano

On October 10, 2017, Officer Fasano responded to a call for medical aid at an apartment complex. A caller reported that his roommate, who had possibly overdosed on heroin, was no longer breathing. The caller began CPR, but when Officer Fasano arrived he found that the man still was not breathing and that his lips had turned blue. Officer Fasano immediately administered Naloxone, with the result that the man inhaled deeply and began to breathe again on his own. Officer Fasano stabilized the man until Newport Beach Fire Department personnel arrived and transported him to a local hospital, where he made a full recovery. Officer Fasano is commended for his quick and decisive action, without which this man might have succumbed to the heroin overdose and passed away.

Lifesaving Award presented to Officers Rachel Cox and Bill Hume

Just before 4:00 a.m. on August 26, 2017, the Department received several calls about screams emanating from the area of an abandoned building near the intersection of 15th Street and Monrovia Avenue. Officers Cox and Hume responded and began to search for the person in distress. By following the muffled moans, they were able to locate a woman lying face down on the ground. She was breathing shallowly, her lips were blue and her mouth was full of vomit. The officers quickly assessed the woman and identified signs of opioid overdose. At the beginning of that very shift, these officers had received their first training on the use of Naloxone; now, mere hours later, Officer Cox administered the medication. The woman regained consciousness and began breathing again. Both officers are commended for their heroic efforts in saving this woman's life.

Lifesaving Award presented to Officer Ricardo Adame

On August 8, 2017, Officer Adame was dispatched to the Post Office on Riverside Avenue in response to an emergency call that a man had passed out in the parking lot. When Officer Adame arrived, he found the victim lying on the ground between two parked vehicles. He pulled the man (who was not breathing and had no pulse) out from between the cars, positioned him on his back, and immediately began CPR. Officer Adame continued his life-saving efforts until Newport Beach Fire Department personnel arrived and transported the man to a local hospital, where he regained his pulse and was placed on a breathing machine. The man ultimately made a full recovery. Officer Adame is commended for his quick response and immediate action in saving this man's life.

Award of Merit presented to Sergeants Josh Comte and Brad Miller, and Officers Jeremy Duenas, Jon Jarema, Chris Kimble, Dennis Maisano and Steve Oberon

On the evening of February 18, 2017, a man called the Department to report that his adult son had been kidnapped and was being held for ransom. The night before, the son had participated in a pre-arranged illegal narcotics transaction, where 60 pounds of marijuana were stolen at gunpoint. The son was blamed for the theft and subsequently kidnapped. The kidnappers threatened to kill the victim if a ransom of \$130,000 was not paid by his family. Working under pressure of that threat, personnel from the Detective Division (Sergeant Miller and Detective Maisano from the Special Investigations Unit along with Burglary Detectives Chris Kimble and Jon Jarema) worked alongside Patrol personnel (Sergeant Josh Comte and Officers Duenas and Oberon) to determine the victim's whereabouts. After an intense investigation, they determined that the victim was being held in an Anaheim apartment, but was being moved to another location. At great risk to their personal safety, this team of NBPD sergeants and officers intervened in the armed suspects' activities and rescued the victim, who was returned to his grateful family. All seven of these employees are commended for their exceptional work in finding and rescuing this kidnap victim.

Medal of Valor presented to Officer Troy Zeeman

On October 1, 2017, Officer Zeeman was off-duty, attending the Route 91 Country Music Festival in Las Vegas with his wife. At approximately 10:10 p.m., a gunman on the 32nd floor of the Mandalay Bay Hotel opened fire on the crowd of 22,000 people below. Officer Zeeman, who was wounded by the gunfire, worked with another off-duty law enforcement officer to get more than 20 other concertgoers to safety, only receiving medical attention for his own injuries five hours after the shooting occurred. His heroic efforts during this horrific event undoubtedly saved multiple lives.

Balboa Peninsula Crosswalks Improvement – Starts Soon!

Beginning mid April, construction crews will be revitalizing crosswalks along Balboa Peninsula with new roadway striping and signage. With over forty project locations, work will move quickly and is planned for completion in late June. Moderate noise and traffic impacts are expected for only a few days at each location.



Concrete Replacement Happening in Port Streets



Taking care of our streets is like building a layered cake. Work has recently been completed to install nearly 200 ADA curb access ramps throughout the City, including the Port streets.



Concrete work begun this week to replace segments of sidewalk and curbs and gutters as inventoried by need and safety. This work will continue to the Spyglass area and parts of Corona del Mar. The icing on the roadway will be fresh slurry as part of the 7-year maintenance cycle to extend roadway life, add aesthetic value and prevent early deterioration.

Civic Center Undergoing Exterior Maintenance

As part of the Facilities Maintenance Master Plan, several city facilities are receiving a paint treatment to their exterior surfaces to increase life expectancy of city assets and prevent premature capital repairs. Over the next few weeks, painting contractor TL Veterans is working at the Civic Center to recoat balcony railings, horizontal beams,

exterior stairs that lead to the loading dock, and light poles in the parking structure.

Work is scheduled for Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and should be complete by April 20.

Scaffolding on the west side of the building will remain in place until the project is completed. The east side of the building (adjacent to the Civic Green) will be painted using scissor lifts and boom lifts. For safety purposes, please walk around scaffolding or other painting areas.









This year's annual Playground Improvement Project is complete, refreshing park playgrounds with new play surfaces, new cool toppers and removal of unused posts. Irvine Terrace Park and Coastal Peak Park received new rubber surfaces, while Begonia Park received artificial turf at the play equipment and sand at the swings. Two unused posts were removed from West Newport Park. As a bonus, sand was received from a recent sand management project. Can you tell which park received new cool toppers?


