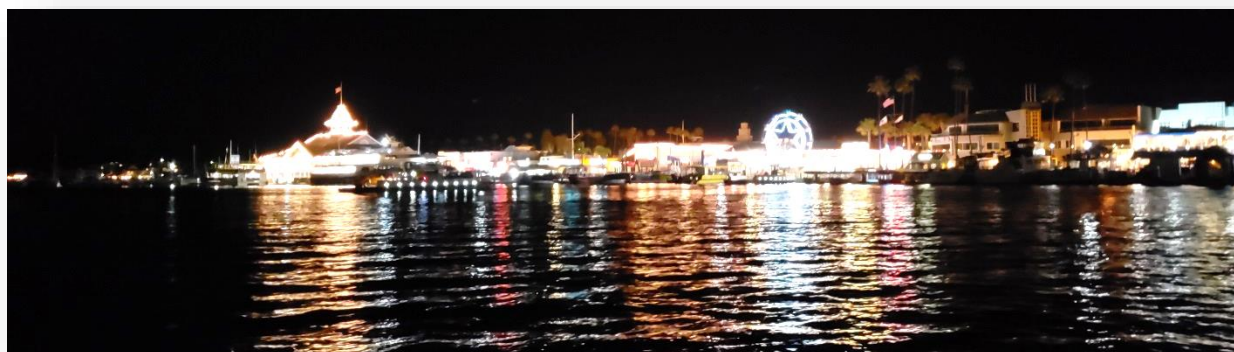
### ***Lido House Completed***

Construction on Lido House is complete and the City of Newport Beach has issued a certificate of occupancy for the hotel and associated areas. Lido House improves the local area and the City of Newport Beach with a beach-inspired architectural design as well as offering an economic boost and providing stability to local businesses.



### ***Harbor Enforcement***

In response to complaints about illegal dumping and unpermitted live-aboards in the harbor, City enforcement staff including the Newport Beach Police Department, Code Enforcement, and Harbor Operations started to patrol the harbor during the late evening and early morning hours. The first "patrol" took place on Saturday night, April 14.





## COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT DEPARTMENT

Staff identified over 15 vessels that are suspected of being used as a live-aboard without the required permit from the City. Additionally, staff addressed several noise complaints associated with charter yachts in the harbor and noted multiple vessels in the moorings that were in violations of the City's mooring permits.

## FIRE OPERATIONS DIVISION

### **Two-Alarm Structure Fire**

On April 10, firefighters from the fire department, with assistance from Huntington Beach Fire Department, Costa Mesa Fire Department, Fountain Valley Fire Department and the Orange County Fire Authority, responded to a two-alarm structure fire at 6302 W. Coast Hwy, in Newport Beach, a single story motel. Upon arrival, firefighters found flames and heavy smoke coming from two of the twelve motel rooms beginning to spread throughout the entire structure. There were no reported injuries to any of the motel occupants. The cause of the fire is still under investigation. Click [here](#) for the OC Register article.



### **Single Vehicle Traffic Collision**

On April 16, the fire department dispatched to a multi-casualty traffic collision on University Drive near MacArthur. Upon arrival, first in units found a single car accident with four patients. Three of the patients were quickly extricated while the fourth patient was trapped requiring extrication tools. Costa Mesa Fire Department and the Orange County Fire Authority assisted fire department personnel at the incident. In total, approximately 20 firefighters from all three departments responded to the call. All four patients were transported to local area trauma centers. The cause of the accident is under investigation by the Newport Beach Police Department.



## **TRAINING**

The Newport Beach Fire Department conducted the 8-month firefighter probation test, which consisted of a comprehensive didactic and manipulative exam. There was a written test and five manipulative stations ranging from Emergency Medical Services to fire ground evolutions.

## **COMMUNITY EMERGENCY RESPONSE TEAM**

### **CERT Mutual Aid Class**

On April 7, the fire department hosted a Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) Mutual Aid class for CERT volunteers. Orange County, California is the only county in the United States that has a full protocol and agreement with how all 34 cities in Orange County can activate and utilize CERT volunteers. The Orange County CERT Mutual Aid Program (CMAP) was nationally recognized by FEMA in 2015 for Outstanding CERT program initiatives. The six-hour CERT Mutual Aid class covers how the City of Newport Beach activates its CERT volunteers (when requested), how Newport Beach CERT volunteers



fit into the overall incident command system, what CERT volunteers should bring and expect with a countywide activation.



#### **CERT American Heart Association CPR/AED Class**

On April 10, the fire department hosted an American Heart Association CPR/AED class for its CERT volunteers. The two and a half hour class was taught and managed by trained CERT volunteers. The class covered all of the requirements for adult CPR/AED.

#### **Irvine Terrace CERT Neighborhood Event**

On April 11, fire department personnel participated in the Irvine Terrace Home Owner's Association quarterly CERT meeting. Irvine Terrace is one of the most organized neighborhoods for unexpected disasters in Newport Beach. At the meeting, their neighborhood plan was reviewed and their neighborhood CERT block captains reviewed their training on how to respond.

#### **Sage Hill School Emergency Preparedness Drill**

On April 17, the fire department participated in an Emergency Preparedness Drill at Sage Hill School. The fire department has been working with Sage Hill School on the school's emergency plans for the past year. In August 2018, the fire department held a complete 20 hour CERT training program for 25 Sage Hill personnel and will hold another one this June.

### Survivor Visits Fire Station 3

The survivor is a retired firefighter who was playing volleyball when he suffered a cardiac arrest in March. Due to the early interventions of lifeguards and fire personnel, CPR and medic support, the patient made a full recovery.

On April 11, the patient and his family, and a nurse, who performed CPR prior to the arrival of fire personnel, visited Fire Station 3 to show their gratitude to crews NE65, NM65, and NE64 who were instrumental in saving his life.

### Assistant Chief Williams Retiring



On May 4, Assistant Chief Rob Williams, will be retiring after 33 years of service. Chief Williams started his career as a seasonal lifeguard in 1985. He became a unit operator in 1990. He promoted and attended the first class for fulltime lifeguard officers in 1997. In 2001, he promoted to lifeguard captain, and in 2006 he promoted to lifeguard battalion chief. In 2011, he promoted to his current position as Chief Lifeguard for Marine Operations. Chief Williams has been instrumental in maintaining the Fire Department's motto of "Safety, Service, and Professionalism" within Marine Operations. He has held several leadership positions for the United States Lifesaving Association, the California Lifesaving Association, and the Orange County Drowning Prevention Task Force. Chief Williams gave pivotal assistance to Newport Beach Lifeguards when the death of Seasonal Lifeguard Ben Carlson occurred in 2014. Chief Williams remained committed and worked tirelessly with local and State officials to recognize that lifeguards should be eligible to receive the State of California Medal of Valor. 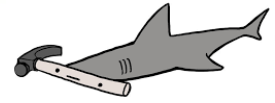

### **Annual Compost Giveaway**

On Saturday, the Municipal Operations Department teamed up with the City's residential refuse collector, CR&R, for the annual compost giveaway. The event was held at the Big Canyon Reservoir (BCR) parking lot off of Pacific View Drive. The bags of compost are given away annually to City residents providing proof of residency. A day before the event MOD staff off-loaded the bags of compost delivered by two 18-wheel tractor-trailers and stored them behind the gates of BCR. MOD staff arrived early Saturday morning to set up the traffic control and to stage the pallets of compost.



Over 3,350 bags of compost were loaded into 891 residents' cars from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. In the four years this event has been staged in Corona del Mar, there has been an average of 936 residents attending each time. This has turned into a very much appreciated event by the area residents. CR&R will be hosting a free-paper shredding event Saturday, May 12, at the same location.



### **Utilities Division Provides Assistance to RSS Department**

Earlier this month, the Recreation and Senior Services Department and the Rotary Club co-sponsored their popular Youth Track Meet of Champions at Corona del Mar High School. 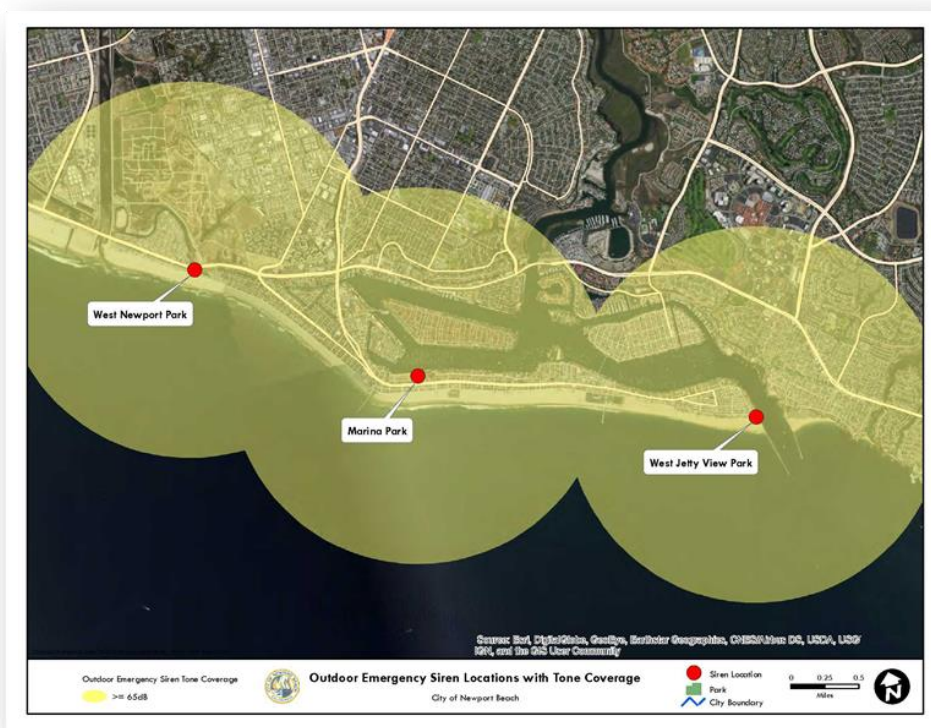

## OUTDOOR WARNING SIREN TEST – FRIDAY, MAY 4

The Newport Beach Police Department will be testing the City's Outdoor Warning Sirens on Friday, May 4, 2018 at noon. The three sirens are located at West Jetty View Park, Marina Park and West Newport Park and are regularly tested on the first Friday of each month at a very low decibel level. During the May test, they will be exercised at a louder decibel level. If you are in the coverage area (outlined in the map below), you will be able to hear the sirens during the test.

The sirens may be utilized for all hazards or disasters where immediate action from the public is necessary. If you hear the sirens, and it's NOT the first Friday of the month, turn on your television to channel 3 and radio to 107.9 KWVE and await further instructions.



Additionally, on May 4, 2018 at noon, Huntington Beach and Laguna Beach will also test their independent Outdoor Warning Systems.

## MADD AWARDS

Every year, Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD) hosts a countywide awards luncheon to recognize Orange County law enforcement officers for their lifesaving work in DUI and impaired driving enforcement.

At this year's event on Thursday, April 12, four of our own officers were honored for their contributions to combatting DUI-related injuries and deaths in 2017. 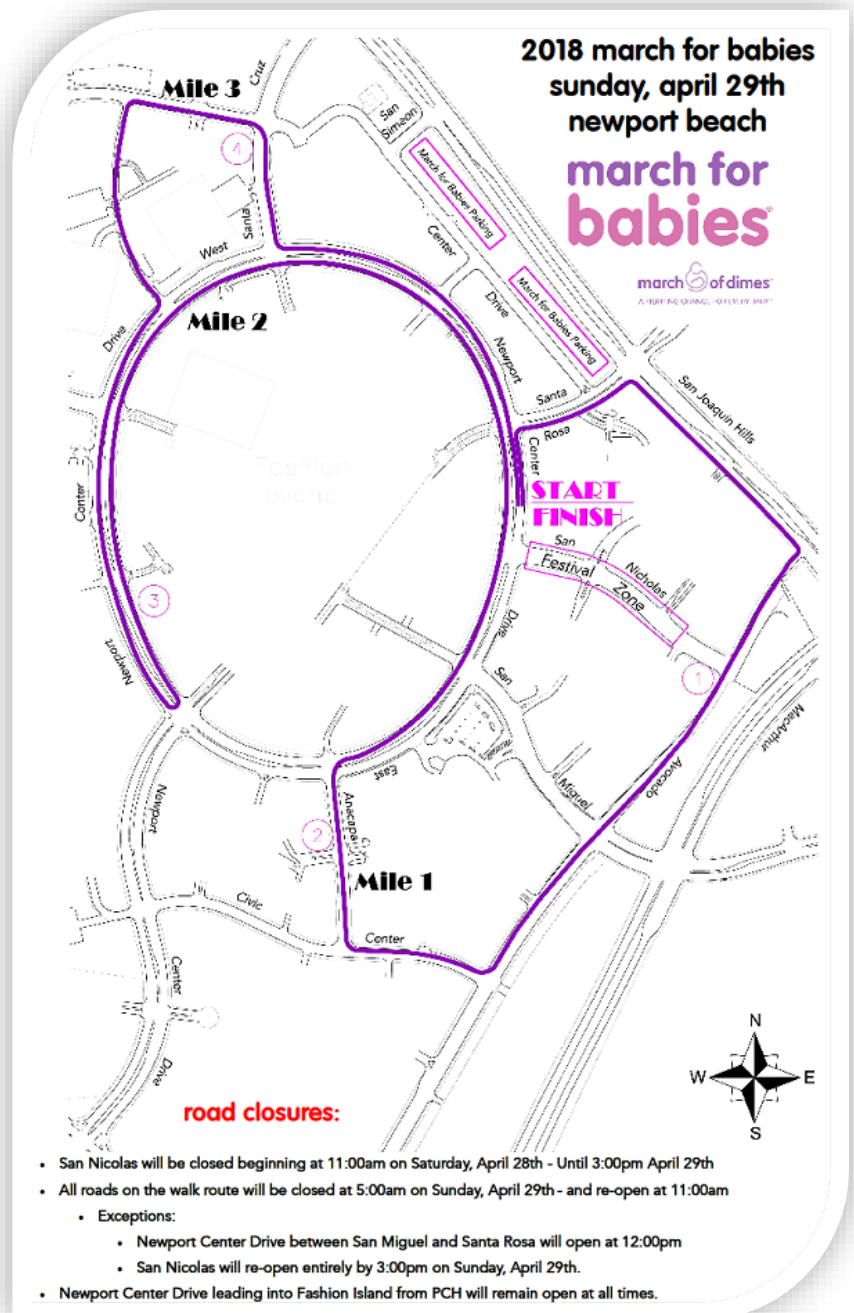
## **April 29 March for Babies Traffic Information**

Public Works is currently working with the Coast Guard to convert the harbor's existing rigid steel pile navigation markers to floating "boat-friendly" buoys. There are a total of six federal markers in the harbor, and two have already been converted. The City is proposing to own and maintain the markers via the Coast Guard's "Private Aids to Navigation" program. The Coast Guard is receptive to the idea, and staff is hoping for approval to replace all the steel piles this calendar year.

## **Balboa Island Water Main Replacement Phase I Complete**

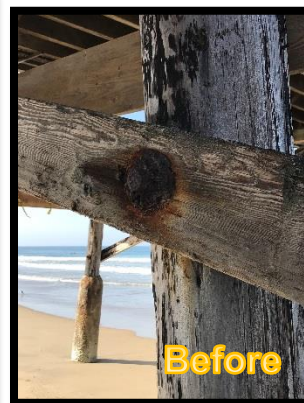

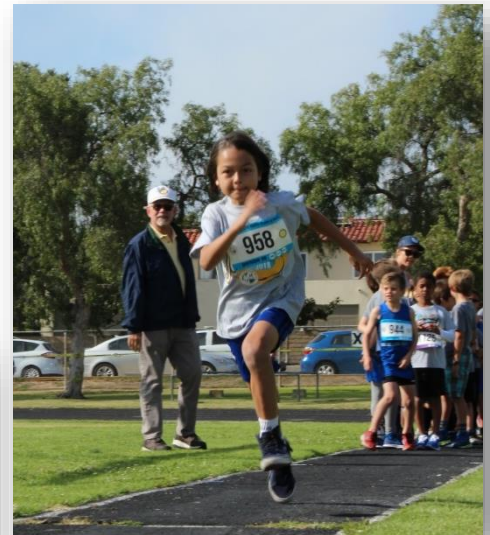
