Hazardous Trees

Every year, falling trees or branches cause tragic deaths, injuries, and tens of millions of dollars in property damage across America. In an effort to prevent a tragedy or property damage, the Code Enforcement Division and the City Arborist have teamed up to identify dangerous trees around the City. Both departments look for trees that have a brown or thinning canopy (especially during growing season), large dead branches, a severe lean, or large cracks or splits in the trunk.

The collaborative efforts of both departments removed another dangerous tree with less than ten percent of live canopy and a failing root system. The tree was located next to a sidewalk used by children, joggers and people walking their dogs on their way to the park.

City Receives OCAPA Award for the West Newport Mesa Streetscape Master Plan

The Orange Section of the American Planning Association's California Chapter (OCAPA) holds an annual countywide awards ceremony to honor projects, plans, and people that exhibit exemplary and exceptional planning practices.

At the recent event, the City and its consultant, RRM Design Group, bested several other nominees to receive the *Outstanding Planning Award* in the category of "Urban Design" for the West Newport Mesa Streetscape Master Plan.

Adopted by City Council in 2016, the West Newport Mesa Streetscape Master Plan is a document designed to establish a vision and foster implementation of an action plan to beautify and improve the public right-of-way within West Newport Mesa. The project area is particularly difficult to address because it includes a large amount of industrially zoned properties, supporting commercial and residential uses all within a close proximity. A panel of five award jurors selected the project for its



thorough approach in addressing all constraints and opportunities while providing a clear set of guidelines that can be implemented in the future by private and/or public development projects.



Treasury Report Update



The April 2018 Treasury Report is available on the City's website at:

www.newportbeachca.gov/treasury.

As of April, the City's portfolio totaled just over \$276 million, from all sources. Roughly \$50 million of this portfolio was highly liquid, meaning it was available for cash flows associated with day-to-day operations and cash funding of major construction expenditures.

The short-term portfolio (\$194 million) had a weighted average effective maturity of 1.67 years. With interest

rates on the rise, the total return for the short-term portfolio was suppressed by unrealized losses from the declining market value of bonds (bond values move inversely to the direction of interest rates). Including these unrealized losses, the trailing twelve months' total return was 0.26%. This return compared favorably to our benchmark for the same period, the BAML 1-3 Year Treasury index, which returned -0.26%. The income yield on the portfolio, a better measure of income derived from the portfolio, was 1.48%.



Keeping Newport Beach Looking Great!

Pressure Washing for Pristine Sidewalks: As we get ready for the summer crowds, street maintenance staff arranged for a contractor to pressure wash the Boardwalks around the perimeter of Balboa Island, the Newport Pier parking lot, and the various surrounding lots around Newport Pier. An important goal of pressure washing is to remove all gum, grease and other items from the sidewalk, which can often prove to be challenging. Our contractor follows all water quality requirements, including vacuuming up all the water, and recycling it.

New Seat/Sand Walls, Sidewalk, Fire Ring Surrounds

Peninsula Park: Some needed Peninsula Park modifications were completed just in time for summer. A new beach sand/seat wall and walkway were just installed to replace the prior deteriorated facility.



Residential Street Slurry Seal Program



This year's slurry seal project is getting underway in the Port Streets and Spyglass neighborhoods. The contractor will begin slurry sealing the residential streets on June 18.

Bonita Canyon Sports Park - Field 5 Renovation

The City's sport and recreation field services contractor recently performed a field renovation at Bonita Canyon Sports Park Field 5. The renovation included 6 inches of deep aeration to help the soil profile, filled with sand/organic mix, then the field was seeded and dressed over the next few months. Field 5 will continue to be aggressively watered to ensure seed growth, making it ready to play on for the next soccer season. CSA Holdings have been contracted with the City for approximately 13 years



Access Ramp Project Complete

The project to improve sidewalk access in the Ports Streets and Spyglass neighborhoods is now complete, where 197 ramps have been installed. For the past several months Public Works and our Concrete Contractor have been working in these neighborhoods to improve mobility for folks using the sidewalk. The project included removal of corner curbs and replacing them with access ramps.

Public Fire Ring Informational Signage

Staff Training Achievements and Enhanced Credentials

APWA Institute

As part of our efforts to continually advance staff's knowledge and education in the field of public works, 5 staff members attended the American Public Works Association (APWA) Institute's Module 4 training held in Downey, CA last month. Peter Tauscher (center), having now completed all 4 training modules, has graduated from the program.



Bi-Lingual Irrigation Training

Maintenance staff held an irrigation training class with two of our contractors, Mariposa Landscapes, Inc., and Park West Landscape Maintenance, Inc. Tom Diaz, our Irrigation Specialist, and Scott Kyle from Rainmaster Control Systems, led the training session in both English and Spanish, covering programming, troubleshooting, and repair of our central irrigation controllers. Now an annual training class, it proved to be a great refresher course for trainees.





Enhanced Credentials for City Arborist

Recently, City Arborist Kevin Pekar attained his Tree Risk Assessment Qualification (TRAQ) after attending a three-day class at Griffith Park in Los Angeles. On the final day, a written and performance-based exam was administered, in which Kevin scored a 99%! The TRAQ credential trains arborists to assess tree risk potential based on multiple observable and measurable factors, including but not limited to, target assessment, site assessment, tree biology, and biomechanics. The factors are analyzed and conclusions are drawn utilizing specifically designed matrices.

International Code Council Certification

Senior Management Analyst Keith Hinckley was recently recertified through the International Code Council as the Underground Storage Tank (UST) System Operator for the City. Every UST system is required to have a Designated Operator who conducts monthly exams, is responsible for scheduling annual line and tank testing, and interacts with the County.

This scholastic year, with the help of 28 Contract Instructors, the ACE sites provided 279 programs and received a remarkable 2,712 total registrations.



SUPERB SERVICE

The Utilities Department is committed to providing clean, safe, and responsive utility and infrastructure maintenance services to the community of Newport Beach. Although residents don't always notice the work we do, now and then someone calls in to express their gratitude. Elisa from Corona del Mar called in to praise Utilities Specialist Tim McDonald for his efficient and superb service. Elisa had a water meter leak, called the Utilities Department, and Tim was onsite within 30 minutes. He found the leak right away and repaired it. Way to go, Tim!

STATE WATER REPORT

The City of Newport Beach Utilities Department has submitted its 2018 Annual State Report for the year ending December 31, 2017 to the Division of Drinking Water (DDW). Section 116530 of the California Health and Safety Code (CHSC) specifies that a Public Water System (PWS) shall be required to submit a technical report to the DDW. The technical report specifies contact and operational information for the prior calendar year.

Data submitted consists of contact information, changes in population, population served, changes in the number and type of service connections, verification of the number of active water sources, the use of standby sources, and compliance with operator certification requirements. Also within the report, there is information on water quality, water rates, water efficiency, conservation and drought preparedness including infrastructure, pressure management, and loss reduction measures.

The Public Water System demonstrates accountability by submitting information for the Annual State Report. Also by providing valuable information to DDW, it will assist the State in the implementation and development of the Safe Drinking Water Act (SDWA) for all water utilities in California.

WATER MAIN BREAK

Now and then a contractor working in the City will hit one of the City's water lines and create a water main break. On Wednesday May 23, that unfortunately was the case again. At 10:15 a.m., a Southern California Gas Company's subcontractor hit a 92-year-old 14-inch cast iron water main. They hit the top of the water main while breaking out a portion of the concrete alleyway behind 214 E Balboa Blvd. Breaking and removing concrete in this particular area can be difficult due to the depth of the water main only being 9 inches below grade. Utilities staff arrived on scene at 10:30 a.m. to shut the water off and repair the broken main. Staff worked efficiently to fix the water main, and after 4 hours, water service to all those affected was restored.

KEEPING OUR OCEAN CLEAN



We all enjoy a clean ocean, and as summer approaches and beachgoers increase, Utilities Department staff is on the front lines of helping to keep the ocean, harbor, and beaches clean.

Last month, the Storm Drain Division crew began to re-install 435 inlet guards in front of area catch basins. Each year, the crew installs the inlet guards after the rainy season ends and removes the guards prior to the start of the rainy season in the fall. The crew installs the inlet guards at various locations throughout the City, especially those with high pedestrian foot traffic. In the 16 years the crew has installed the inlet guards, they have proven to be an effective tool to stop debris from entering our harbor, beaches, and ocean so residents and tourists can safely enjoy recreational activities.





THE QUIET MANHOLE

Our wastewater crew responds to all types of requests from residents; from clean out installations, to strong sewer smells, to calls about noisy manhole covers. Last month, a resident called to inform staff of a noisy manhole cover near her home, which was unusually loud when cars drove over it. When our wastewater crew heard, they were ready to save the day! The crew found that the manhole cover was loud because it was loose. Staff removed the old five-inch concrete ring, which holds the manhole cover in place, and the three-inch layer of asphalt cap around the manhole to accommodate the new ring and cover. Just like that, our residents can now enjoy a quieter day.

TIDAL VALVE REPLACEMENT

There are 36 tidal valves on Balboa Island as well as 53 tidal valves on Newport Peninsula. These valves are manually closed during high tides to prevent localized flooding. The valves require ongoing maintenance because they are submerged in salt water year round. During these times of maintenance, valves are inspected for wear and worn parts and are either replaced or rebuilt as needed. If extensive wear is detected, the entire valve is removed from the seawall and replaced using rust-resistant stainless steel hardware that will last in the harsh marine environment.

Last month, Storm Drain staff members James Moureaux and Ruben Martinez took advantage of low tides to perform regular maintenance on several, aged manual tidal valves on Newport Peninsula. James and Ruben replaced a 16-year-old 12-inch Fresno valve at 36th street and Finley Avenue, and they rebuilt a 20-year-old 12-inch valve at 33rd Street and Marcus Avenue.
