Harbor Pointe Senior Living Project EIR Released



In November 2015, the City received an application to redevelop Kitayama Restaurant, located at 101 Bayview Place, as a combined senior assisted living and memory care facility with 120 beds. Once the applicant had refined the project description and design to address concerns of the community and staff, the City's consultant began preparing the draft Environmental Impact Report (EIR). An EIR is required to address reasonably foreseeable environmental impacts resulting from the project's implementation under the California Environmental Quality Act.

The draft EIR has been completed and was released for public review and comment. An electronic copy is available on the City's website here. Hard copies are available at City Hall in Bay B on the first floor, as well as in each library location. The Planning Commission will be re-introduced to this project at its regular meeting on September 6, 2018. No action on the EIR or the project will occur at this meeting.



COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT DEPARTMENT

The comment period will run for 50 days and will conclude on September 28, 2018. Planning Commission and Airport Land Use Commission hearings are anticipated late 2018, with City Council action occurring early 2019.

Mutual Aid Response to California Wildfires

Newport Beach firefighters deployed on July 25 to assist with the Cranston Fire (Idyllwild) and were released on July 28 to immediately assist at the Mendocino Complex Fire. Ten firefighters have returned and we sent additional firefighters to provide relief, with 11 currently working wildfires in the state. We have a paramedic deployed at the Carr Fire (Redding) as a single resource Public Information Officer.



Carport Fire



On July 31, firefighters responded to a carport fire that threatened residential units located above the carports. Five vehicles were extinguished by firefighters.



Hands Only CPR

On July 23, Newport Medic 63 taught a hands only CPR class to the residents of the Meridian complex. Paramedic Cathey took the lead, with assistance from Paramedic Reed and the crew of Engine 63 B Shift. The residents enjoyed the class and are looking to purchase an AED for their complex. Notable Call

On July 31, crews from Engine 263: Captain Reis, Engineer Blythe, Firefighter Thornbury; Medic 65: Paramedics Kang and Kimoto; Truck 63: Captain Lazar, Engineer Fernandez, Firefighter Popovich, and Tiller Skelly, responded to a pediatric near drowning in a backyard spa. Firefighters arrived to find an infant child unresponsive with CPR in progress. Advanced life support measures were performed and the infant was transported to the hospital and was expected to make a full recovery.

New Paramedics - Medic Academy

Firefighters Levins, Keyes, and Stribling are the department's newest firefighters with prior State paramedic certifications. They have completed a rigorous internal process consisting of 42 hours of extensive classroom training and 96 hours of field training by Chief Thompson to work as paramedics for the Newport Beach Fire Department.



MACCABI GAMES TABLETOP EXERCISE

On Tuesday, July 30, staff attended a Tabletop Exercise in the City of Irvine to discuss the Jewish Community Center (JCC) and the Orange County Maccabi Games. The JCC Maccabi Games, an Olympic style sporting competition, will include over 3,000 Jewish teenagers from around the world and will be held from August 5 through August 10, 2018. Although the majority of the events will be held in Irvine, there will also be events, activities and ceremonies held at UCI and in Long Beach, Newport Beach, Santa Ana and Anaheim.

The Tabletop Exercise included the event-organizing committee, representatives from the impacted cities and federal partners who gathered to discuss emergency plans and simulate disaster scenarios in order to increase preparedness.



SCAM ALERT

We have heard several concerns about "Kidnapping Scams" here in Newport Beach, so we have been reaching out to the community to increase awareness. Here is an alert we shared this week through Nixle and social media:

Have you heard of "Kidnapping Scams"? Here's how they work:

You get a call, saying that a loved one has been kidnapped. The caller may make threats, demand money, or lead you to believe that your loved one is in danger.

But... is the caller who you think it is? Scammers are good at pretending to be someone they're not. They can be convincing: sometimes using information from social networking sites, or hacking into email accounts, to make it seem more real. And they'll pressure you to send money before you have time to think.



Here's what you can do:

- Stop. Check it out. Try to contact the loved one who you are concerned about, or call friends or another family member.
- 2. **Keep your information (and your money) safe.** Never give out personal identifying information, such as bank account or credit card account numbers, to anyone you do not know. And never send money to an unknown person.
- 3. **Pass this information on to a friend.** You may not have received one of these calls, but chances are that you know someone who will if they haven't already.

Topping Off at CdM Fire Station and Library Project

Earlier today, a Topping Out ceremony was held for Corona del Mar Fire Station No. 5 and Library. This involved the placing of the last structurral beam for the new building. Prior to

its placement, the beam was signed by City Council members

and key individuals involved with the project.







Note of Interest: The term Topping Out traditionally refers

to the installation of the last beam of a structure, or the completion of a building's roof,



bridge or other large structure, signifying the structure has reached its maximum height and but not yet the completion of the project. The final structural piece is often painted white and signed by members of the construction team and community leaders. Sometimes an evergreen tree is attached to the beam. Topping Out symbolizes positive things—good luck for future occupants, continued growth, a safe job—and celebrates an important milestone in a building's construction.

Working Through the Night to Prevent Flooding

Sometimes working past midnight is just part of the commitment for City field maintenance crews as they prepare the beaches to safeguard

against the the possibility of flooding resulting from high surf tides. Staff monitors surf and tide projections and advisories daily on Surfline and other weather websites to watch for possible events of concern.

In the event of expected high surf or tides, crews typically work to construct sand berms in the early morning hours before the arrival of beach goers. During summer months, high tides often occur at night. Generally, staff and equipment are brought out and staged at the beach during high surf events. In case of any failing berms, staff may work well into the night to fix a problem or rebuild these protective sand berms while the rest of us are sound asleep.

Last week, predicted tides were 7 feet and surf came in at 10 to12 feet at Balboa Pier and 8 to 10 feet at 40th Street. Sand berms were built at Balboa Pier and monitored for three days during peak high surf. Two loaders were on standby during the high tides. After the event, the beaches were cleaned of any debris and then regraded back to normal service conditions.




Corona del Mar Underground Utility Assessment District No. 117


Located in Corona del Mar, and bounded by Bayside Drive, Avocado Avenue, Coast Highway and Carnation Avenue, construction for Underground Utilities Assessment District No. 117 project is underway.

Contractor Asplundh Construction Corp began work on July 19 for this Public Works project. Currently, the contractor is busy trenching and installing conduit and utility vaults along First Avenue.

Construction on Pacific Drive and Acacia Avenue will so begin on August 13.

City Gateway Signs Get a Refresh

The City has 14 Gateway Entry Signs on major thoroughfares marking the entry points into the City. In our on-going effort to Keep Newport Beach shining and looking great, Public Works and its contractor Bravo Signs just recently cleaned and painted these signs to brighten their appearance, offering a warm welcome to visitors, commuters and residents alike.







For six of the signs, the 3D golden sails had to be removed to refurbish, repaint and recoat them before reattaching them to the signs.





Mariners Branch Library Gets New Carpeting

Public Works recently replaced the carpeting at Mariners Branch Library. The original carpet, installed when this popular branch first opened in 2006, has experienced much traffic. During installation, the library closed temporarily. Library staff, flooring contractor and furniture moving contractor worked in tandem relocating book stacks to complete the library carpeting in sections. During the closure, library staff set up an area where patrons could pick up books placed on hold and treasured prizes from the summer reading program. The facility reopened on July 28, 2018, right on schedule!



<u>Fun Fact</u>: The next time you walk into Mariners Branch Library, notice there are two types of carpeting near the Circulation Desk. The dark blue carpeting is an abrasive carpet has brush-like threads to dust off people's shoes before they step onto the lighter blue carpeting you see elsewhere in the library. This helps extend the life of carpeting throughout the library.

New Grass Field Installed at Newport Elementary School

The newly rehabilitated playfield at Newport Elementary School is looking green and lush with the recent installation of new grass sod and other field improvements. **Public Works Municipal** Operations staff are currently maintaining and watering the field as the sod takes root. Once the sod has fully adhered, the field will reopen to the school and public. Next, the asphalt playground will be seal coated on August 30 and 31, before the start of the new school year.



Massive Sand Accumulation in San Diego Creek to be Removed!

Since completion of a 2 million cubic yard dredging project in the Upper Bay in the 80's, County and City stakeholders have been taking proactive steps to remove upstream sediment accumulated in San Diego Creek before it washes into the bay. Our next effort to keep sediment out of the bay will be the 405 to 405 sediment removal project which will remove 172,000 cubic yards of sediment from San Diego Creek at a cost of \$4.3M.



The project, recently approved by the OC Board of Supervisors, will begin in August.

"DG" at the DP (Dog Park)

To keep dogs and their humans safe while running and walking at the dog park, City crew chief Rich Trevino coordinated with the City's contractor Park West Landscape to raise the decomposed granite (DG) to its original level. This project was completed within two days.





Fire Hazard Mitigation and Fuel Abatement

During fire season, dried tall grasses and weeds offer a dangerous source of fuel for wildfires. Public Works plans for and tries to proactively address these potential hazardous conditions. Pictured here is Middle Buck Gully where the slope areas of 62 lots were recently cleaned up to within 100 feet from each structure. This includes trees being separated, limbed up, and all weeds and dense shrubs removed.



Fuel abatement efforts also were completed in Spyglass, Nature Park, and Goat Hill areas. With Public Works oversight, our contractor Southland Landscape has done a great job.

BUCK GULLY & THE READY OC FIRE WATCH

Fire season is in full swing in California, and at least one fire is hitting close to home in Orange County. Here in Newport Beach, we have a unique open space called 'Buck Gully', which extends from Newport Coast all the way to its terminus at the Little Corona tidepools.

Buck Gully is maintained by the Irvine Ranch Conservancy. Crews of staff and volunteers work to clear nonnative plants that can act as fuel for fires since they are only alive during the rainy season, leaving them dry and vulnerable to ignition during the warm summer. The plants are then replaced with species native to the area, which stay alive year round (even if it does not necessarily look like it). Plants that are still alive are much

less likely to act as fuel to a brush fire, which lessens the chance of a fire in the area.

Irvine Ranch Conservancy also helps coordinate volunteers for the Ready OC Fire Watch program, which stages volunteers in vulnerable areas to look for dangerous or suspicious activity in sensitive areas. If they see a fire begin, they are able to communicate with authorities and get the proper people to the site of the fire as quickly as possible.

Evening Canyon Repair

This past week, the Wastewater staff made repairs to a sewer lateral on Evening Canyon. They used the new vactor truck, which is equipped with a high-pressure hydro excavator attachment. The hydro excavator exposed the cast iron pipe, which was partially blocked with roots.






Summer Cleaning

This past week, Storm Drain staff utilized their small vacuum truck on Balboa Island. When staff is performing their monthly tidal valve maintenance, they make a note of any tidal valve structures that need cleaning. The structures that store the rubber flapper valves, which automatically close as the tide rises, typically tend to fill up with sand because they are not self-cleaning. Staff will then head out with the Utilities small vacuum truck, which is easier to maneuver on Balboa Island, to perform the cleaning. If the sand/debris is deemed by staff to be obstructing a tidal valve from operating correctly, it is prioritized to be cleaned as soon as possible to prevent future flooding on City streets.





Big Canyon Wetlands Maintenance

The recently restored wetlands located in Newport Back Bay off Jamboree was designed to improve water quality in Big Canyon Creek by removing pollutants such as selenium from dry and wet weather flows. During the dry season, low flow water in the creek is diverted to the sewer. Storm Drain staff open the low flow valve to guide the water to the sewer. However, if the water was still diverted to the sewer during the rainy season, the sewer system would be overwhelmed. Thus, when the rainy season nears, Storm Drain staff close the valve to keep the wet weather flows from inundating the sewer system.

Storm Drain staff will respond to this system when the low flow line becomes clogged with debris. They will take 4-inch trash pumps to the area that has ponded and pump the water out of the outlet structure to gain access to the low flow drain, which when clogged is covered in 2.5 feet of mossy water. Once pumped down, staff sweeps out the algae and clears off the drain grate of debris to allow the dry weather low flow water to circulate back to the sewer.





Water Valve Replacement

On Wednesday, July 18, the Maintenance and Repair Staff removed and replaced an aging 6-inch water distribution valve with a new resilient seat gate valve. The new valve is expected to last over 40 years!

In order to make repairs, the Maintenance and Repair Staff isolated the water main from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m., which affected the water service to 17 nearby residents. Although shutting the water off is inconvenient to residents, ultimately it will be much more effective because the new valve will allow staff to isolate the water main in case of an emergency or scheduled repairs.
