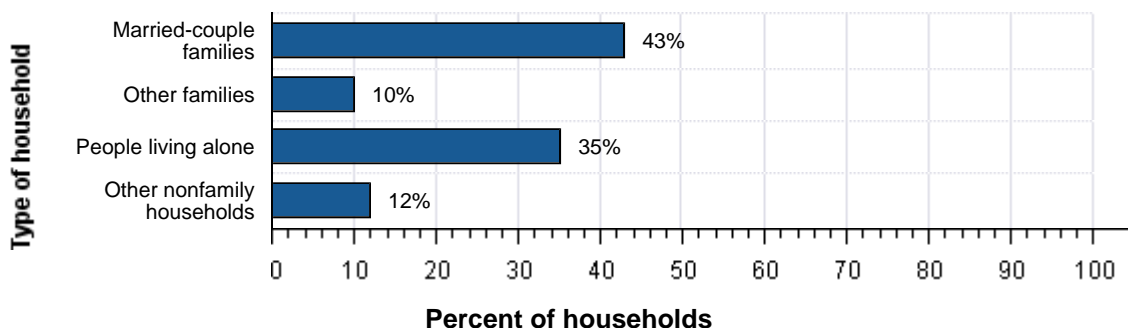

HOUSEHOLDS AND FAMILIES: In 2006 there were 38,000 households in Newport Beach city. The average household size was 2.3 people.

Families made up 53 percent of the households in Newport Beach city. This figure includes both married-couple families (43 percent) and other families (10 percent). Nonfamily households made up 47 percent of all households in Newport Beach city. Most of the nonfamily households were people living alone, but some were composed of people living in households in which no one was related to the householder.

The Types of Households in Newport Beach city, California in 2006

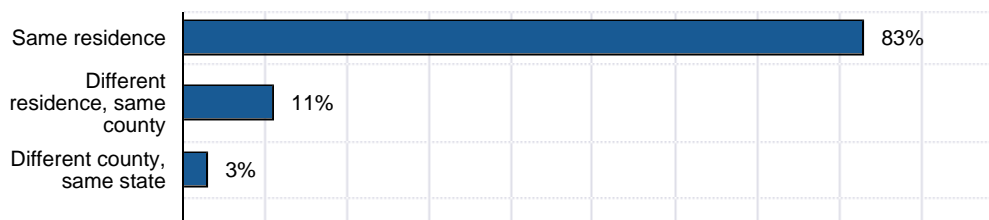


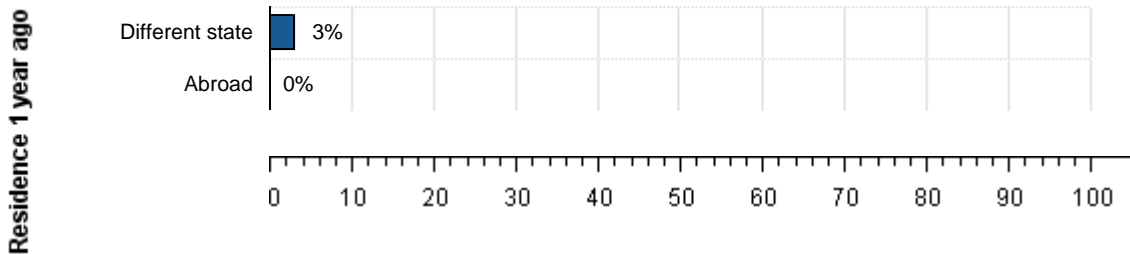

NATIVITY AND LANGUAGE: Data for this section cannot be displayed because the number of sample cases is too small. Displaying the data would risk disclosing information for individuals.

GEOGRAPHIC MOBILITY: In 2006, 83 percent of the people at least one year old living in Newport Beach city were living in the same residence one year earlier; 11 percent had moved during the past year from another residence in the same county, 3 percent from another county in the same state, 3 percent from another state, and less than 0.5 percent from abroad.

Geographic Mobility of Residents of Newport Beach city, California in 2006





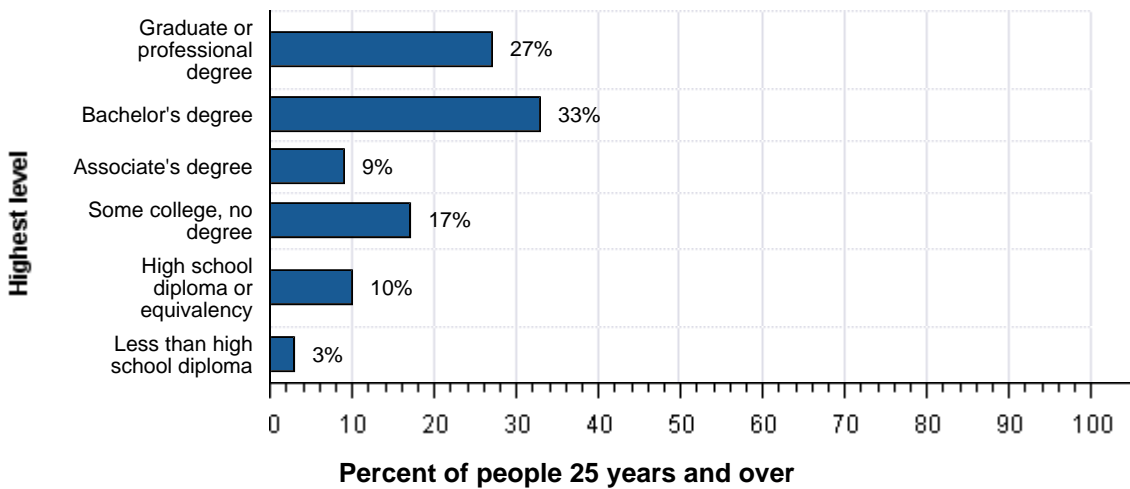
Percent of people age 1 year and over

EDUCATION: In 2006, 97 percent of people 25 years and over had at least graduated from high school and 60 percent had a bachelor's degree or higher. Three percent were dropouts; they were not enrolled in school and had not graduated from high school.

The total school enrollment in Newport Beach city was 20,000 in 2006. Nursery school and kindergarten enrollment was 2,700 and elementary or high school enrollment was 12,000 children. College or graduate school enrollment was 5,300.

The Educational Attainment of People in Newport Beach city, California in 2006



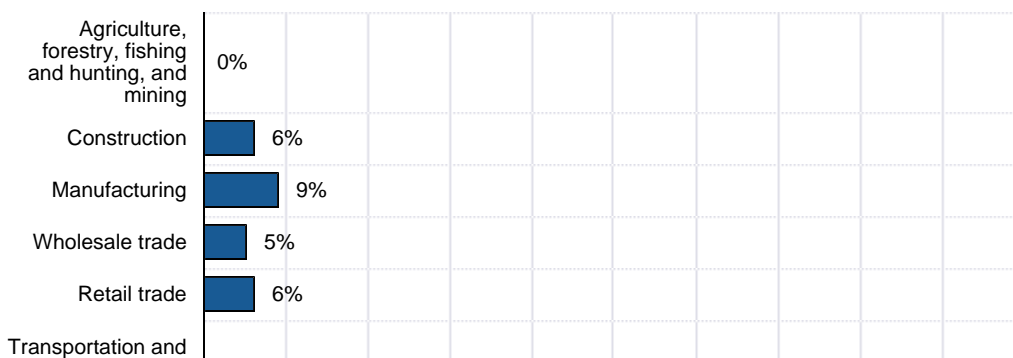
Percent of people 25 years and over

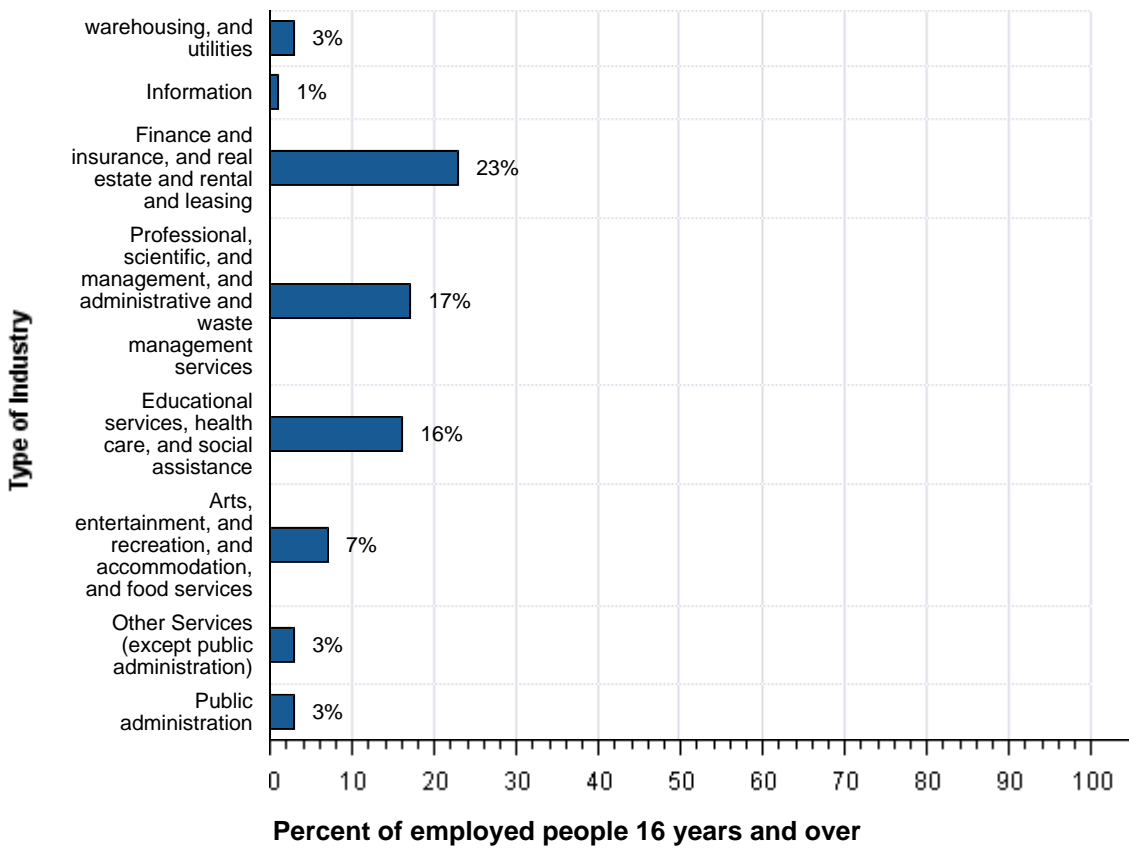

DISABILITY: In Newport Beach city, among people at least five years old in 2006, 7 percent reported a disability. The likelihood of having a disability varied by age - from 2 percent of people 5 to 15 years old, to 2 percent of people 16 to 64 years old, and to 27 percent of those 65 and older.

INDUSTRIES: In 2006, for the employed population 16 years and older, the leading industries in Newport Beach city were Finance and insurance, and real estate and rental and leasing, 23 percent, and Professional, scientific, and management, and administrative and waste management services, 17 percent.

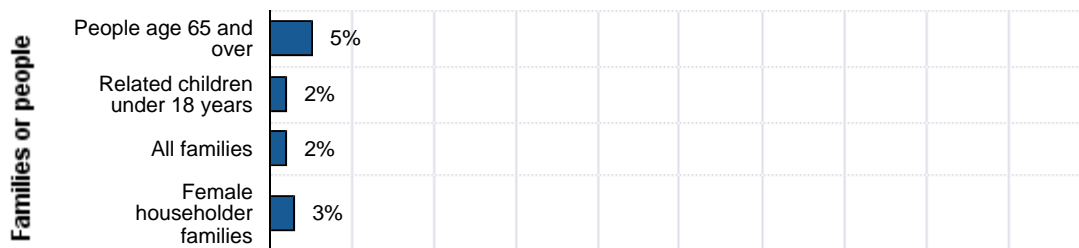
OCCUPATIONS AND TYPE OF EMPLOYER: Among the most common occupations were: Management, professional, and related occupations, 58 percent; Sales and office occupations, 25 percent; Service occupations, 9 percent; Construction, extraction, maintenance and repair occupations, 5 percent; and Production, transportation, and material moving occupations, 3 percent. Seventy-five percent of the people employed were Private wage and salary workers; 7 percent was Federal, state, or local government workers; and 17 percent was Self-employed in own not incorporated business workers.

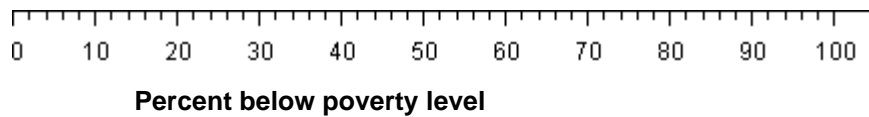
TRAVEL TO WORK: Seventy-eight percent of Newport Beach city workers drove to work alone in 2006, 6 percent carpooled, 1 percent took public transportation, and 5 percent used other means. The remaining 9 percent worked at home. Among those who commuted to work, it took them on average 23.6 minutes to get to work.

INCOME: The median income of households in Newport Beach city was \$103,068. Eighty percent of the households received earnings and 14 percent received retirement income other than Social Security. Thirty-one percent of the households received Social Security. The average income from Social Security was \$17,071. These income sources are not mutually exclusive; that is, some households received income from more than one source.

POVERTY AND PARTICIPATION IN GOVERNMENT PROGRAMS: In 2006, 4 percent of people were in poverty. Two percent of related children under 18 were below the poverty level, compared with 5 percent of people 65 years old and over. Two percent of all families and 3 percent of families with a female householder and no husband present had incomes below the poverty level.

Poverty Rates in Newport Beach city, California in 2006

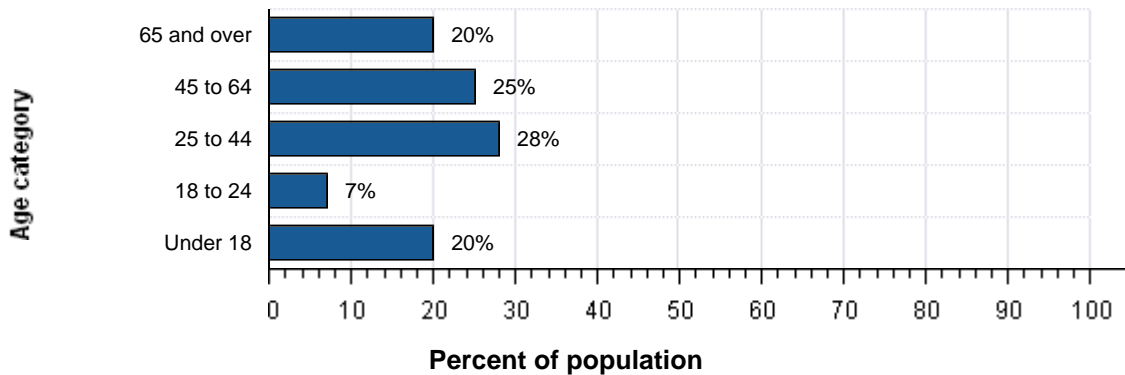

POPULATION OF Newport Beach city: In 2006, Newport Beach city had a total population of 87,000 - 44,000 (51 percent) females and 42,000 (49 percent) males. The median age was 41.8 years. Twenty percent of the population was under 18 years and 20 percent was 65 years and older.

The Age Distribution of People in Newport Beach city, California in 2006

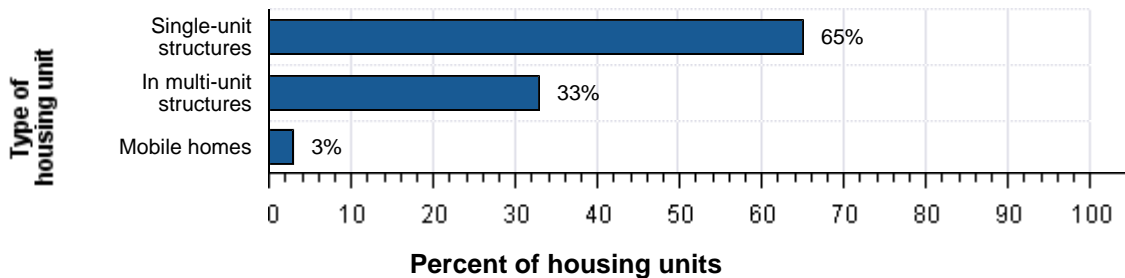

For people reporting one race alone, 91 percent was White; less than 0.5 percent was Black or African American; less than 0.5 percent was American Indian and Alaska Native; 6 percent was Asian; less than 0.5 percent was Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander, and 2 percent was Some other race. One percent reported Two or more races. Seven percent of the people in Newport Beach city was Hispanic. Eighty-five percent of the people in Newport Beach city was White non-Hispanic. People of Hispanic origin may be of any race.

HOUSING CHARACTERISTICS: In 2006, Newport Beach city had a total of 44,000 housing units, 12 percent of which were vacant. Of the total housing units, 65 percent was in single-unit structures, 33 percent was in multi-unit structures, and 3 percent was mobile homes. Twenty-four percent of the housing units were built since 1990.

OCCUPIED HOUSING UNIT CHARACTERISTICS: In 2006, Newport Beach city had 38,000 occupied housing units - 23,000 (60 percent) owner occupied and 15,000 (40 percent) renter occupied. Three percent of the households did not have telephone service and 2 percent of the households did not have access to a car, truck, or van for private use. Multi Vehicle households were not rare. Forty-two percent had two vehicles and another 20 percent had three or more.
