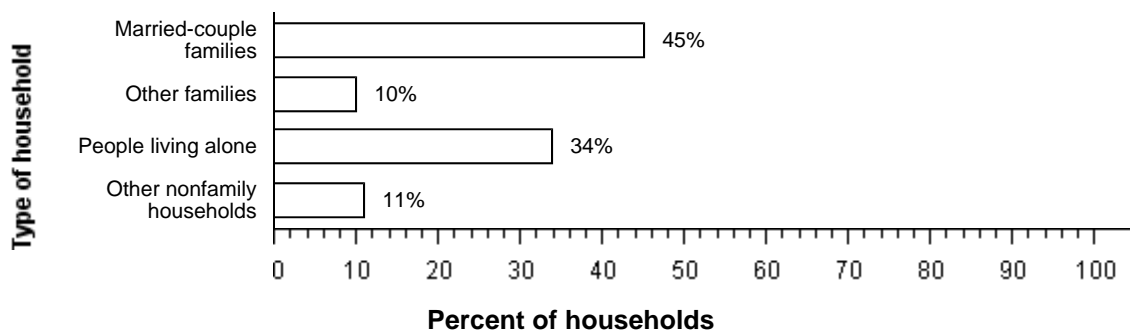

HOUSEHOLDS AND FAMILIES: In 2005 there were 36,000 households in Newport Beach city. The average household size was 2.3 people.

Families made up 55 percent of the households in Newport Beach city. This figure includes both married-couple families (45 percent) and other families (10 percent). Nonfamily households made up 45 percent of all households in Newport Beach city. Most of the nonfamily households were people living alone, but some were comprised of people living in households in which no one was related to the householder.

The Types of Households in Newport Beach city, California in 2005

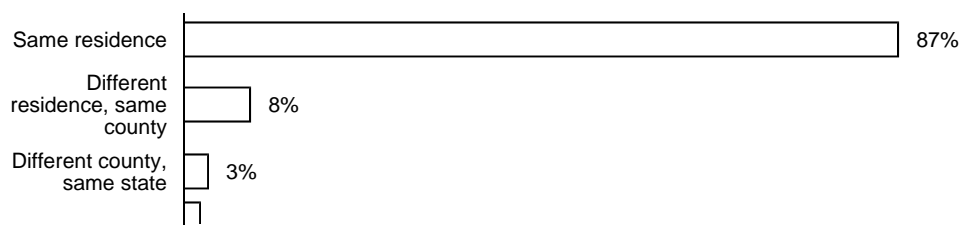


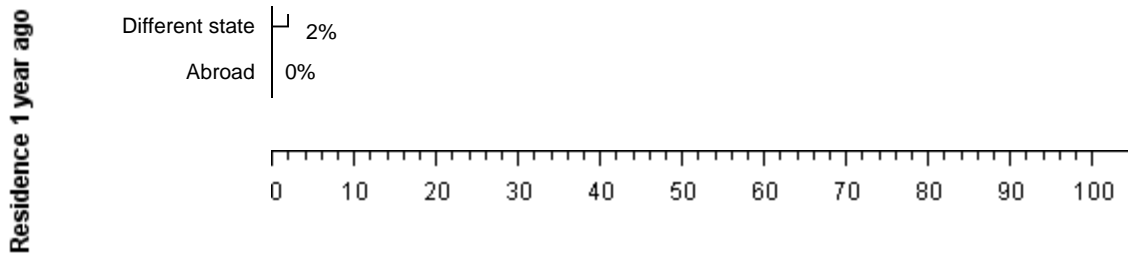

GEOGRAPHIC MOBILITY: In 2005, 87 percent of the people at least one year old living in Newport Beach city were living in the same residence one year earlier; 8 percent had moved during the past year from another residence in the same county, 3 percent from another county in the same state, 2 percent from another state, and less than 0.5 percent from abroad.

DISABILITY: In Newport Beach city, among people at least five years old in 2005, 8 percent reported a disability. The likelihood of having a disability varied by age - from 2 percent of people 5 to 20 years old, to 5 percent of people 21 to 64 years old, and to 27 percent of those 65 and older.

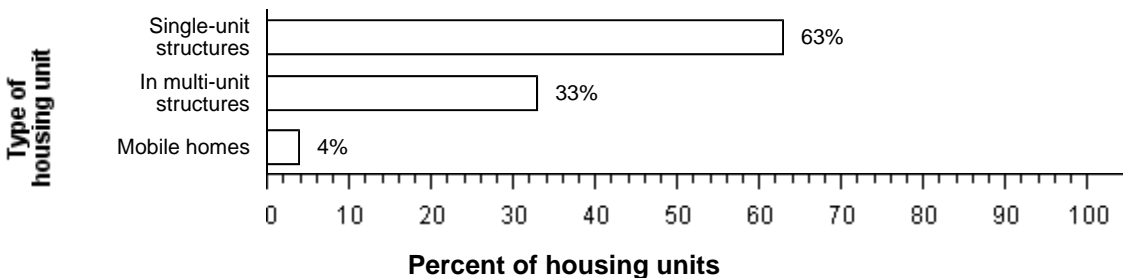

INCOME: The median income of households in Newport Beach city was \$97,428. Eighty percent of the households received earnings and 14 percent received retirement income other than Social Security. Twenty-eight percent of the households received Social Security. The average income from Social Security was \$16,487. These income sources are not mutually exclusive; that is, some households received income from more than one source.

HOUSING CHARACTERISTICS: In 2005, Newport Beach city had a total of 41,000 housing units, 14 percent of which were vacant. Of the total housing units, 63 percent were in single-unit structures, 33 percent were in multi-unit structures, and 4 percent were mobile homes. Twenty-two percent of the housing units were built since 1990.

The Types of Housing Units in Newport Beach city, California in 2005

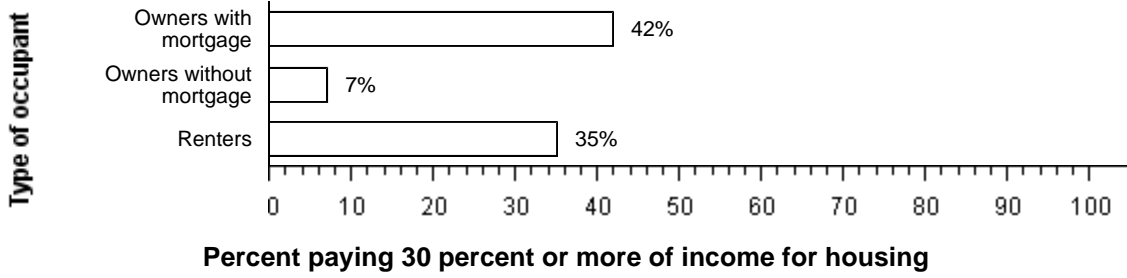

OCCUPIED HOUSING UNIT CHARACTERISTICS: In 2005, Newport Beach city had 36,000 occupied housing units - 23,000 (63 percent) owner occupied and 13,000 (37 percent) renter occupied. Two percent of the households did not have telephone service and 2 percent of the households did not have access to a car, truck, or van for private use. Multi Vehicle households were not rare. Forty-five percent had two vehicles and another 19 percent had three or more.

HOUSING COSTS: The median monthly housing costs for mortgaged owners was \$3,621, nonmortgaged owners \$595, and renters \$1,542. Forty-two percent of owners with mortgages, 7 percent of owners without mortgages, and 35 percent of renters in Newport Beach city spent 30 percent or more of household income on housing.
