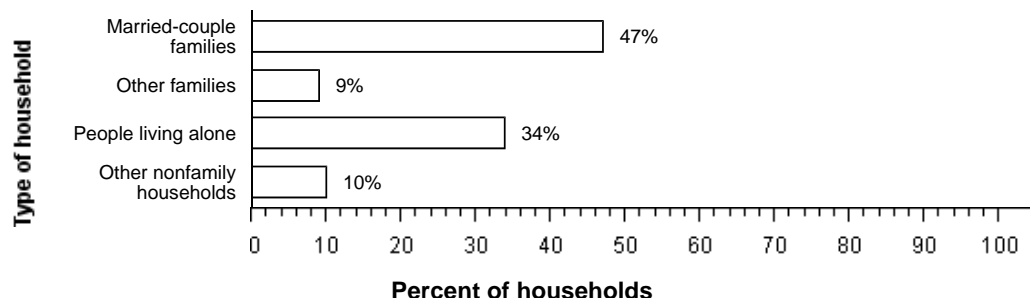

HOUSEHOLDS AND FAMILIES: In 2008 there were 38,000 households in Newport Beach city. The average household size was 2.3 people.

Families made up 57 percent of the households in Newport Beach city. This figure includes both married-couple families (47 percent) and other families (9 percent). Nonfamily households made up 43 percent of all households in Newport Beach city. Most of the nonfamily households were people living alone, but some were composed of people living in households in which no one was related to the householder.

The Types of Households in Newport Beach city, California in 2008

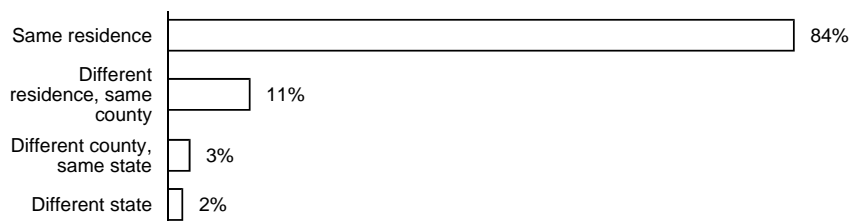


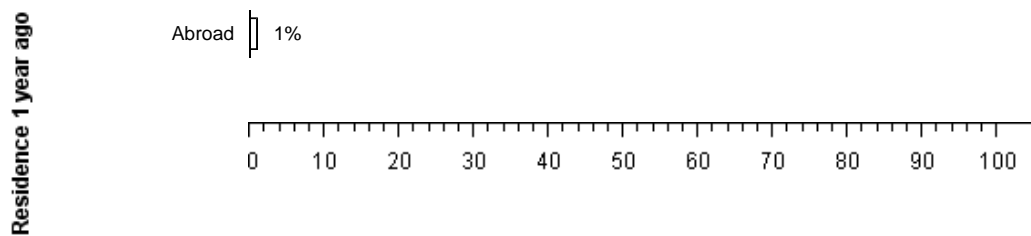

GEOGRAPHIC MOBILITY: In 2008, 84 percent of the people at least one year old living in Newport Beach city were living in the same residence one year earlier; 11 percent had moved during the past year from another residence in the same county, 3 percent from another county in the same state, 2 percent from another state, and 1 percent from abroad.

Geographic Mobility of Residents of Newport Beach city, California in 2008





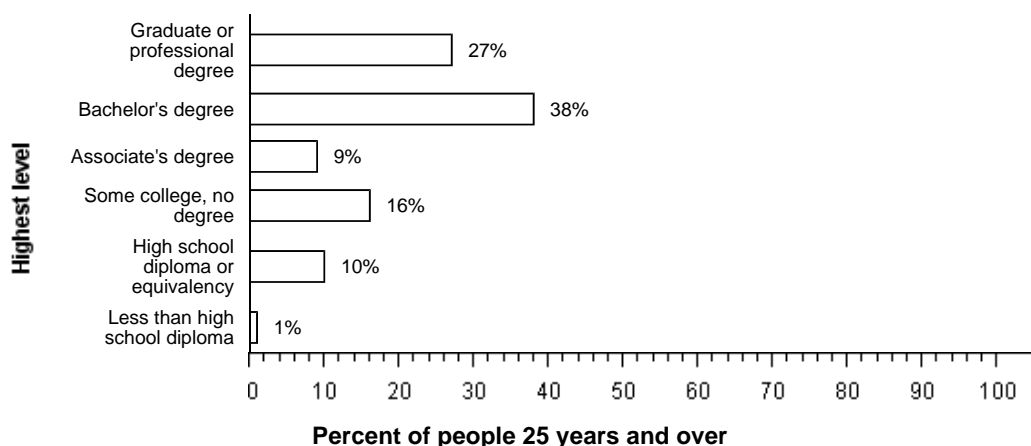
Percent of people age 1 year and over

EDUCATION: In 2008, 99 percent of people 25 years and over had at least graduated from high school and 64 percent had a bachelor's degree or higher. One percent were dropouts; they were not enrolled in school and had not graduated from high school.

The total school enrollment in Newport Beach city was 22,000 in 2008. Nursery school and kindergarten enrollment was 3,200 and elementary or high school enrollment was 12,000 children. College or graduate school enrollment was 7,300.

The Educational Attainment of People in Newport Beach city, California in 2008

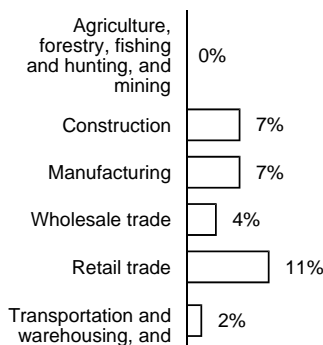


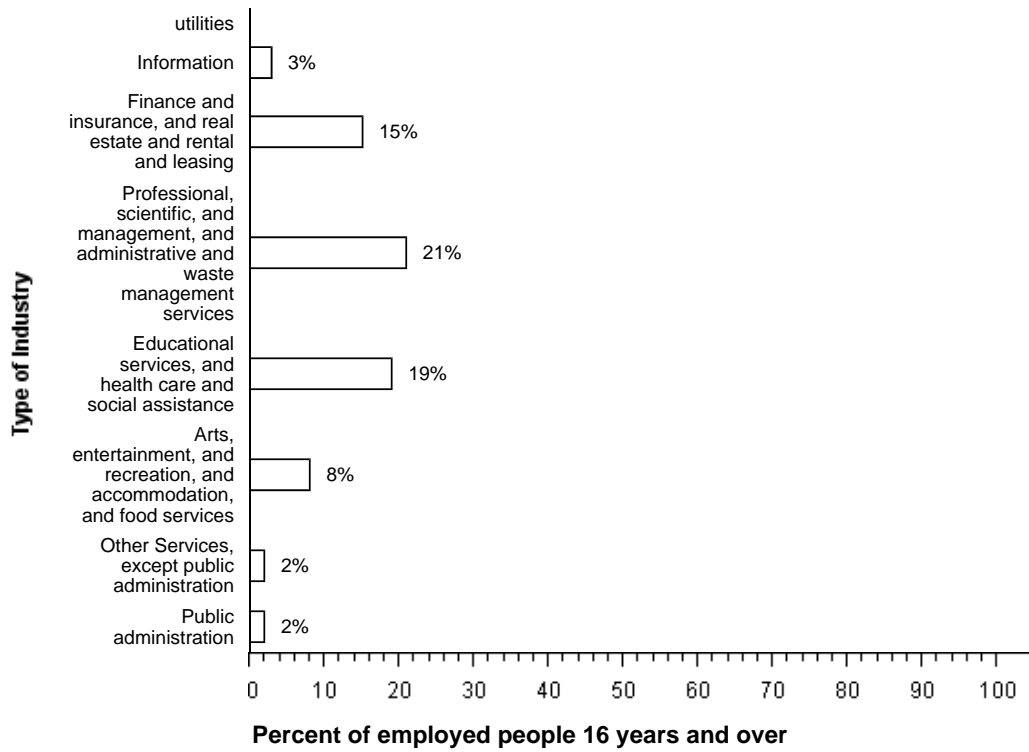

DISABILITY: In Newport Beach city, among people at least five years old in 2008, 5 percent reported a disability. The likelihood of having a disability varied by age - from 2 percent of people 5 to 15 years old, to 2 percent of people 16 to 64 years old, and to 21 percent of those 65 and older.

INDUSTRIES: In 2008, for the employed population 16 years and older, the leading industries in Newport Beach city were Professional, scientific, and management, and administrative and waste management services, 21 percent, and Educational services, and health care, and social assistance, 19 percent.

OCCUPATIONS AND TYPE OF EMPLOYER: Among the most common occupations were: Management, professional, and related occupations, 58 percent; Sales and office occupations, 29 percent; Service occupations, 7 percent; Construction, extraction, maintenance and repair occupations, 4 percent; and Production, transportation, and material moving occupations, 2 percent. Eighty percent of the people employed were Private wage and salary workers; 9 percent was Federal, state, or local government workers; and 11 percent was Self-employed in own not incorporated business workers.

TRAVEL TO WORK: Eighty-one percent of Newport Beach city workers drove to work alone in 2008, 5 percent carpooled, less than 0.5 percent took public transportation, and 6 percent used other means. The remaining 7 percent worked at home. Among those who commuted to work, it took them on average 23.8 minutes to get to work.

INCOME: The median income of households in Newport Beach city was \$123,958. Eighty-two percent of the households received earnings and 13 percent received retirement income other than Social Security. Twenty-four percent of the households received Social Security. The average income from Social Security was \$18,032. These income sources are not mutually exclusive; that is, some households received income from more than one source.

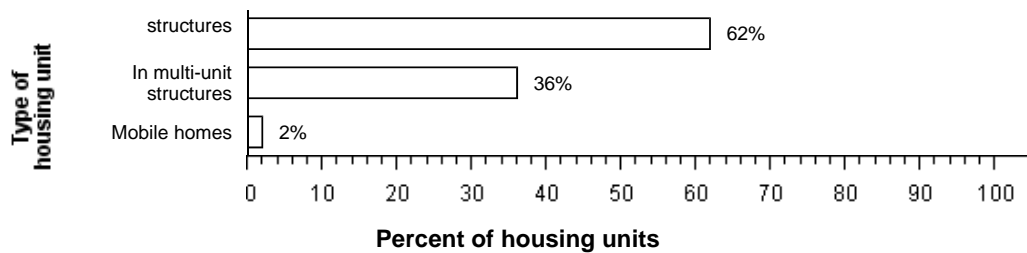

HOUSING CHARACTERISTICS: In 2008, Newport Beach city had a total of 44,000 housing units, 14 percent of which were vacant. Of the total housing units, 62 percent was in single-unit structures, 36 percent was in multi-unit structures, and 2 percent was mobile homes. Twenty-two percent of the housing units were built since 1990.

Single-unit |

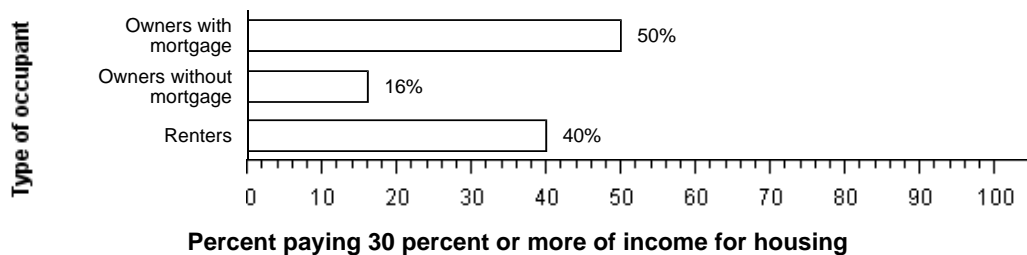

OCCUPIED HOUSING UNIT CHARACTERISTICS: In 2008, Newport Beach city had 38,000 occupied housing units - 21,000 (56 percent) owner occupied and 17,000 (44 percent) renter occupied. Less than 0.5 percent of the households did not have telephone service and 3 percent of the households did not have access to a car, truck, or van for private use. Multi Vehicle households were not rare. Forty-three percent had two vehicles and another 21 percent had three or more.

HOUSING COSTS: The median monthly housing costs for mortgaged owners was \$4,001, nonmortgaged owners \$727, and renters \$1,896. Fifty percent of owners with mortgages, 16 percent of owners without mortgages, and 40 percent of renters in Newport Beach city spent 30 percent or more of household income on housing.

Data are based on a sample and are subject to sampling variability. The degree of uncertainty for an estimate arising from sampling variability is represented through the use of a margin of error. The value shown here is the 90 percent margin of error. The margin of error can be interpreted roughly as providing a 90 percent probability that the interval defined by the estimate minus the margin of error and the estimate plus the margin of error (the lower and upper confidence bounds) contains the true value. In addition to sampling variability, the ACS estimates are subject to nonsampling error (for a discussion of nonsampling variability, see [Accuracy of the Data](#)). The effect of nonsampling error is not represented in these tables.

3. An '-' following a median estimate means the median falls in the lowest interval of an open-ended distribution.
4. An '+' following a median estimate means the median falls in the upper interval of an open-ended distribution.
5. An '****' entry in the margin of error column indicates that the median falls in the lowest interval or upper interval of an open-ended distribution. A statistical test is not appropriate.
6. An '*****' entry in the margin of error column indicates that the estimate is controlled. A statistical test for sampling variability is not appropriate.
7. An 'N' entry in the estimate and margin of error columns indicates that data for this geographic area cannot be displayed because the number of sample cases is too small.
8. An '(X)' means that the estimate is not applicable or not available.

5. An '***' entry in the margin of error column indicates that the median falls in the lowest interval or upper interval of an open-ended distribution. A statistical test is not appropriate.
6. An '*****' entry in the margin of error column indicates that the estimate is controlled. A statistical test for sampling variability is not appropriate.
7. An 'N' entry in the estimate and margin of error columns indicates that data for this geographic area cannot be displayed because the number of sample cases is too small.
8. An '(X)' means that the estimate is not applicable or not available.

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
